

SAN FRANCISCO FAMILY DROWNS IN BAY PLUNGE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8. (UP)—Three persons were drowned here today when their speeding automobile plunged off a pier into San Francisco bay.

The dead were: John F. Barron, 40; his wife, Dorothy, 37, and their son, John, 7.

Police investigating the tragedy believed it was an accident. The Barron family lived in Hartingame. For more than 15 years Barron was a salesman in the contract department of B. N. and E. Walter company, large rug and carpet firm. He had been off duty for three or four weeks because of illness. Friends said he was wealthy.

Machine Rescued
The car plunged into a channel near the Fourth street bridge shortly after dark. It was several hours before the machine was raised.

An hour before the car was lifted high enough for the opening of a door, the body of Mrs. Barron came to the surface of the water. She was identified by George D. Barron, brother of the dead man, and San Francisco fireman. Later the fireman identified the bodies of his brother and his nephew.

Cause Unknown
Cause of the tragedy may never be known. There were only two witnesses of the fatal plunge. Fred Hartwell and Charles Hallstrom. They did not see the car until it careened off the edge of an unenclosed wharf that runs perpendicular to the bridge. The bridge was open at the time, they said.

Authorities said it was possible that the car was speeding and the driver did not notice that the way was closed until too late to stop. The car could have swerved to the left and then shot off the wharf in the darkness. Barron and his wife took turns at driving the car, the brother said, and it could not be determined which was at the wheel at the time of the accident.

Fire Chief Brennan said the position of the boy's body indicated he was in the back seat and had jumped forward just before the machine went into the water.

Willamette Mapping Finished at Eugene

EUGENE, Jan. 7. (UP)—Mapping of the Willamette river has been completed as far as the conjunction of the Willamette and McKenzie rivers, the board of army engineers announced today.

Topography of the immediate banks and depth sounding every 100 feet are included in the work, which looks toward canalization.

Farmers of Wisconsin Bring Forward Direct Relief Plan; Funds Asked From Treasury

MADISON, Wis., Jan. 8. (AP)—From the alfalfa fields of Wisconsin, dirt farmer legislators have brought to the state capital what is perhaps the most direct plan of farm relief ever to gain the serious attention of an American legislature.

"Pay us," say the farmers, "out of the state treasury."

Asking that the state take the lead rather than wait for relief from the federal government, the farmers have frankly asked for a subsidy. There is \$24,500,000 in the general fund of the state and spokesmen for the farmers say they are entitled to part of it.

The subsidy bill passed the assembly with a big majority. Although young Governor Philip F. LaFollette has declared in favor of "redistribution of wealth," he has expressed no definite opinion on the bill.

The subsidy plan rode into the legislature on the tail of a bill to provide an eight-hour day for Wisconsin laborers. Farmers were agreeable to the idea that city workers should labor only eight hours. But they insisted the farmers be included somehow.

As originally worked out, and as the assembly accepted it, 73 to 9, every farmer was to receive 30 cents an hour for an eight hour day and time and a

half for overtime. He was to sell the products of his farm, and if the sum did not equal payment on the basis suggested by the bill, the state was to make up the difference. Under the plan, assemblymen insisted, farmers would be singing in the rain and smiling in the drought. And if it were a good idea in Wisconsin, it should be through the nation, they added.

But the sober element began to figure, and calculated that the measure might mean paying as much as \$500,000,000 annually to the state's 450,000 farmers. The measure is now amended so that the state may not expend more than \$5,000,000 annually on the subsidy, and that amount shall be raised through dividend taxes and surtaxes on incomes. The farmer is guaranteed a return of two per cent on the assessed valuation of his farm and enough more to assure him at least the 30 cents an hour wage on the basis of an eight hour day.

The senate has yet to act on the amended measure.

Assemblymen John Fronck, Frank Panser, Ray Lawton, and L. S. Shauger introduced the bill—and they believe in it. Farmers, they said, have the same definite rights to profit as do manufacturers, whom they state are subsidized already by tariffs and whatnot.

GAS USAGE CHECKED ON CITY EMPLOYEES

Councilman J. E. Van Camp made the statement Thursday that K. L. Elliott, attorney for Wallace Stitch and R. W. Smith who have filed a protest against Harry Dalley, was apparently misinformed as to the ability of

anyone to check gas used by city employees.
Elliott, in a statement before the Taxpayers' Protective League of Klamath county, Wednesday night, said it was almost impossible to check on the number of gallons of gas used by city employees during a month or any period of time.

Van Camp claims that there is an attendant at the city gas pumps at all times, and before anyone is allowed to obtain gas he must have a requisition blank which is signed by the attendant.

RANCHERS DONATE FOOD TO INDIANS

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8. (UP)—Ranchers in Mono basin were distributing food to scores of Indian families late today and residents of the region anxiously awaited the approach of road

crews cutting their way through huge snow drifts.
The basin has been snowbound for two weeks and scores of white people, who went in for the holidays, have been unable to leave. Indian families were said to be facing starvation except for the supplies given them by ranchers.

Rescue crews, with snowplows and tractors, had hoped to reach the basin today, but the breakdown of machinery slowed their progress. About five miles of tight-packed snow ranging from five to ten feet in depth separated the crews from the basin late today.
