

CALL FOR WOOL IS MODERATE IN WEEK'S TRADING

BOSTON, Jan. 8, (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There has been a moderate demand for wool, which has implied rather more interest on the part of the mills. Mostly, the call has been for fine and half-blood combing wools, but there is some request for woolen descriptions, also, and the market is generally steady."

"Sales resumed in Australia at about the same level of prices prevailing prior to the holidays. South Africa is on a competing level with Australia. Bradford and the continental markets are firmer."

"Reports from the goods market indicate a fairly early resumption in business, especially in view of the fact Easter is early this year. Consumption has fallen off in the last three or four months, but in 1931 was fully 30 per cent greater than in the previous year."

"Mohair continues slow with little interest except in sampling for woolen purposes."

PORTLAND, Jan. 8, (AP)—Weakness continues to dominate the market for dairy products with butter inclined to drag weakly although there were no general changes in the price list today on the open market occasional price shading is reflected in an effort to force sales but some business is being done at full figures. However the general structure is depressed.

Make of butter continues to reflect more than seasonal volume in practically all parts of the country, a condition which creates more or less weakness in the entire domestic trade. With foreign butter being freely offered along the Atlantic coast and more in sight if that could be moved, the home offerings naturally are made to feel this competition.

CIRCUIT COURT TRIAL SCHEDULE IS ANNOUNCED

The schedule of criminal and civil cases set for trial during the month of January and early February was announced Friday by Lloyd DeLap, clerk of the circuit court.

The most important cases to come up for trial are the case of the state of Oregon versus George W. Wolfe, charged with robbery armed with a dangerous weapon in connection with the Bonanza bank hold-up; the case of the state versus R. D. Whitteley, charged with reckless driving in connection with the death of G. W. Tenover; and the case of the state versus Ralph Johnson, also charged with reckless driving in connection with the death of Sydney Appleby, who died from injuries sustained in an accident which occurred on South Sixth street.

Much interest is evidenced in the Johnson and Whitteley cases, as it is the second trial for Johnson, the first being dismissed because of a hung jury. This will be the first trial for Whitteley although he has been indicted three times on the reckless driving count. The first two indictments were quashed because they failed to show the names of all witnesses testifying before the grand jury.

Support Weakens For All Grains

CHICAGO, Jan. 8, (AP)—Abrupt falling off in overseas demand for North American wheat did much to pull speculative buying support out from under all grains today.

Late advances in securities were largely ignored, and there was a material narrowing of the spread between Liverpool and Chicago wheat quotations with Liverpool May delivery quoted only 1/4 of a cent over Chicago at the time Liverpool closed today. On the other hand domestic milling demand here for wheat showed substantial improvement.

Wheat closed unsettled 3/8-1/2 lower than yesterday's finish, corn also 3/8-1/2 off, oats 1/4 down and provisions unchanged to 7 cents decline.

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STOCKS MOVE UPWARD WITH BUYING ORDERS

NEW YORK, Jan. 8, (AP)—New buying orders, placed during the afternoon, kept stocks moving upward for the third successive session today. Bonds also rallied, gains being especially impressive in the railroad group.

Principal shares finished 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 higher and closing prices represented the top quotations of the day.

Utility stocks turned buoyant in the last hour under the leadership of American Telephone which had a sharp rally. Shorts in Auburn auto received another severe queaking; they also had to pay dearly for several other volatile issues.

Rumors circulated in brokerage house customers' rooms said the upturn had been helped by purchasing orders from some prominent professional operators who had been almost consistently bearish over the last two years. One of these traders was said to believe that the line of least resistance was currently on the upside.

American Telephone rushed up 1/4 a share to \$120 and U. S. Steel jumped 1/2 to \$42.62. Alkali Chemical at \$71.25 was up 1/4, while Coca Cola rose about \$4.60 to \$112.50. Auburn soared \$10 to above \$140. The turnover approximated 1,700,000 shares.
