

Pelican Teams Have Distinction

No Other Athletic Team in Country Has Similar Nickname: Eugene Has Best Boxing Year in History.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Jan. 8. (UP)—The formal signing of contracts for the Max Schmeling-Mickey Walker world heavyweight championship bout at Miami, Fla., February 26, was postponed today until 2 p. m. tomorrow.

All details for the match have been decided, but in the absence of President W. F. Carey of Madison Square Garden, New York, and Leonard Saxo, president of the Illinois Garden, the formal signing was delayed.

The Klamath basketball team will bundle itself into a bus this morning for a "mysterious" trip to Bend to meet the Lava Bears in one of the most important two-game series in this district. Both Dwight French, coach, and the squad of courtmen were confident Thursday night of putting up an exceptional battle for the first lap of the championship race, but were decidedly doubtful over the possibilities of victory.

The Pelicans will enter the series in central Oregon with something of a patched-up lineup. Sheets, forward, may not be in the starting five unless the sudden swelling in his neck becomes normal. Bill Estes, the other regular forward, probably will start, but he is just returning to playing strength after a sprained ankle.

Allen, center, and Knight, guard, have become the only two regulars certain of opening the game against the veteran best quintet. Broland or McAninch have been selected as two possible starters at the other guard.

Don Knieval, crippled guard, will make the trip with the team and may return to the game by Saturday night.

The complete roster will include Sheets, Pernel, Knieval, Allen, Estes, Broland, Mayhew, McAninch, Knight, Fred Hale, manager, and Dwight French, coach.

French will look toward the second game of the series as having the brightest prospects of a Klamath victory. The Pelicans never have played the Lava Bears at basketball, and it probably will take the first contest to get a line on offensive and defensive formations.

This opening series will have a definite bearing on the district championship since both the Pelicans and the Bears have been regarded the two leading contenders in this region. A return series will be played in Klamath Falls later in the season, and then the rivals probably will meet again in the district championship.

TENNIS RANKINGS MAY CAUSE ROWS

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (UP)—The selection of a committee of the United States Lawn Tennis association has come up with a ranking list for 1931 that may provide material for plenty of verbal fireworks when the association holds its annual meeting in New Orleans next month.

There can be no quarrel, of course, with the selection of Ellsworth Vines for the No. 1 place in men's singles, nor with the choice of Mrs. Helen Wills Moody for a similar spot on the women's division, but elsewhere in the list are rankings open to dispute.

Behind Vines, the national champion, the committee has placed George Lott at No. 2; Frank Shields at No. 3; John Van Ryn, No. 4; Johnny Doe, No. 5; Cliff Sutter, No. 6; Sidney Wood, No. 7; Keith Gledhill, No. 8; Wilmer Allison, No. 9, and Berkeley Bell, No. 10.

In that array, the one really disputable point seems to be the ranking of Van Ryn at No. 4, in preference to Doe, national champion and No. 1 player in 1930.

Helen Jacobs Second
The rise of Gledhill to the No. 5 post puts the two ranking juniors of 1929 in the first ten. Gledhill was ranked No. 1 among the juniors two years ago, and Vines No. 2. A year ago Vines had jumped to No. 1 in the national ranking.

Ranking behind Mrs. Moody in the women's singles are Helen Jacobs, Mrs. L. A. Harper, Mrs. Marion Zinderstein Jessup, Mary Greif, Marjorie Morrill, Sarah Palfrey, Mrs. Marjorie Van Ryn, Virginia Hilleary and Mrs. Dorothy Andrus Burke.

Battalino Likely To Renounce Title

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (UP)—Regardless of the outcome of his 15-round title defense against Lew Feldman at Madison Square Garden tomorrow night, Bat Battalino appears likely to become 1932's first ex-champion.

The bout will be Battalino's sixth defense of the featherweight championship he won from Andre Rouls in 1930 and probably will be his last. For although the Hartford fighter has proved his superiority over all rivals in his class, weight-making is beginning to exact its toll and if he wins tomorrow night, Battalino is expected to renounce his title and try for the lightweight championship.

Battalino was forced to reduce 14 pounds in 10 days to make the 126-pound limit for the Feldman fight.

EDGREN WILL MEET WITH GOV. ROLPH

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Jan. 8. (UP)—Robert Edgren, authority on boxing, will remain a member of the State Athletic commission until next Thursday, when he has agreed to meet Governor James Rolph, Jr., at the Biltmore hotel in Los Angeles.

Whether Edgren will insist on leaving the boxing board at that time or will withdraw his resignation, which was received by the governor this week, depends entirely upon developments during his conference with the governor.

Governor Rolph announced details for the meeting here late today after talking over the telephone with Edgren, who was at his home in Pacific Grove.

Ice Trials Will Be Held Sunday

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Jan. 8. (UP)—Trials to determine the speed skaters who will represent the United States in the Olympic winter games at Lake Placid, February 4-12, will be held at Ghadwick lake Sunday.

William M. Taylor, coach of the American team, which has been training in Bear mountain since December 6, has suggested that the Olympic squad of 18 men confine themselves to the following events, but will not forbid candidates to participate in additional events: 500, 1,500, 5,000, and 10,000 meters.

MONROE WILL GET TEST AGAINST FOX

Young Frankie Monroe, Klamath Falls boxer, will draw one of the fastest moving opponents of his four-year career in the ring when he meets Teddy Fox of Portland in a six-round fight at the Legion hall Monday night.

But Monroe has not touted rivals before, and has become confident he will win his first appearance under Herb Owen, recently appointed Klamath Falls fight promoter.

In four years of boxing Monroe, managed by Tim McGrath, old time ring enthusiast and sport writer now living in San Francisco, has come off with fair balance of victories. Among his outstanding wins were decisions over Frankie Kliek and Jack Kirk. Several weeks ago in San Francisco Monroe earned a draw with Johnny La Mar, and then lost a close bout to Mat Calo in the main event at Santa Rosa.

Showing with Monroe and Fox in the three six-round fights will be Young Dr. Smell, Portland, and Buddy Ambrose, Salem; Chief Thomas, Coquille, and Pete Becker, Colorado.

The prospects of fast action and knockouts in the preliminary four-round fights has drawn some attention from the major bouts. Johnny Jackson, Chiniquin Indian, will meet Johnny Garley, Mexican from Portland. Butch Johnson, another Indian boy from Chiloquin, has been matched against Louis Nelson, Portland.

Jack Hibbard, Klamath Falls 140-pounder, will open Monday night's action with his fight against the "Iron Man" of Eugene, Jerry O'Neal.

Tickets for Owen's first fight card here have been placed on sale at The Mecca, Waldorf and Smoke shop.
