

# WAR ATHLETES STILL CLING TO OLD GLORY

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (AP)—The old guard—that brilliant group of athletic leaders who skyrocketed into fame during the post-war era and gave America its most glamorous decade of sport—may be falling, but it refuses to surrender.

After more than a dozen years of competition, the veterans—Dempsey, Ruth, Tilden, Hitchcock, Jones and Hagen, youthful sensations of the early '20's—still continue to crowd younger rivals out of the spotlight.

**All Active**  
All except Jones are still in active competition, and it would not be surprising to see the emperor of golf resume his competitive career in the near future. Thus, the veterans still come pretty close to dominating their particular sports.

**Max Schmeling** holds the world heavyweight boxing championship and probably is the best man in his field, but Jack Dempsey still remains as the best drawing card in the game. And despite his 37 years the former champion will have strong backing if he attempts to regain the crown from Schmeling.

**Tilden Going Strong**  
Bill Tilden relinquished his amateur tennis leadership a year ago, and Ellsworth Vines of California gives promise of becoming a worthy successor. However, Tilden transferred his activities to professional tennis, is playing better than at any time in recent years.

**Hobby Jones**, youngest of the "veterans," also retired from amateur play last year. He played no tourney golf in 1931 but is likely to return to action as a "business man" golfer. And if he does there is little doubt he will pick up where he left off and continue as unquestioned leader of the game. Many youthful players bid for his place last year but none were able to fill the bill and the amateur championship fell to the veteran Francis Ouimet, who previously held the title way back in 1914.

**Hitchcock Top Rank**  
Tommy Hitchcock, who for the past decade has been polo's ace, again is rated as a 10-goal man in the 1932 rankings, with his nearest rival at eight goals. Although lack of practice kept him below top form in 1931 there would be few dissenting votes to ranking him as the world's finest player.

**Young Pepper Martin** of St. Louis captured baseball interest during the 1931 world series but with preparations under way for 1932, Babe Ruth again is the most talked of player in the game. Although almost as old as Dempsey, Tilden and Hagen, Ruth had one of his best seasons last year, and his ranking as the diamond's unchallenged leader is attested by the fact that his 1932 contract probably will call for a renewal of his \$10,000 salary—more than double the highest salary ever given any other player.

# ATHLETICS AND SENATORS LOOM AS FAVORITES

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (AP)—Satisfied his Philadelphia Athletics still are the class of the

American league, Connie Mack has decided to stand by his guns in 1932.  
A survey by the Associated Press indicates the A's alone of eight league contenders will face the wire in April with exactly the same lineup that closed the 1931 race.  
The New York Yankees have purchased a couple of expensive young infielders, Jack Saltzgaver and Frank Crosetti, to plug up what Manager Joe McCarthy regarded as his only serious weakness.  
**Senators Plug Hole**  
Washington has obtained Carl Reynolds from the White Sox. He is expected to prove the

answer to Walt Johnson's plea for a slugging, right-handed outfielder.  
Despite their best efforts, the five other clubs apparently have not been able to acquire what it takes.  
Three of them—Cleveland, Detroit and St. Louis—promise to be little, if any, stouter than last year.  
**Fonseca Replaces Bush**  
The Browns did not make a single trade. Cleveland is thinking of shifting Eddie Morgan to the outfield and putting Bruce Cannister from New Orleans at first. Detroit, sorely in need of batting strength, hopes to find

a .300 hitter or two among its newcomers.  
The winter's biggest upheaval occurred at Chicago, following the death of the "Old Roman" Charles Comiskey, and the elevation of his son, Louis, to the club presidency. Donie Bush has been replaced by Lew Fonseca as manager.  
**Fancy Trading**  
Under Fonseca's influence, the club did some fancy trading at the annual meeting, and, in the opinion of many observers did itself some good. In addition to Sad Sam Jones and Irving (Humps) Hadley, obtained from Washington, the Sox got another veteran curver in Milton Gaston

from whom young Lefty Bob Welland went to Boston. Fonseca hopes Ted Lyons, the greater right hander, will return to form.  
Should the Boston Red Sox continue to improve as they did under John Collins last season, they might very well prove a sensation with the exception of Welland, they obtained no recognized talent but they return with the same combination that fought its way into sixth place late in 1931.
