

TAX REDUCTION FOR YEAR HIGH, REPORTS SHOW

value of \$331,774.94 and an assessed valuation of \$10,491.105.26 upon which \$202,478.33 will be raised with a tax rate of 19.3 mills against 22.7 mills a year ago.

Honanza will raise \$1,090.22 this coming year on an assessed value of \$60,911.83 which is \$3,276.17 less than a year ago. The Honanza levy will be 17.9 mills where it was 15.4 mills a year ago or an increase of 2.5 mills.

Malin will have a levy of 30.4 mills where a year ago it was 27.9 to raise a total of \$2,154.18 for 1932 on an assessed valuation of \$103,756.10 which is \$1,028.30 less than in 1931. Merrill, with an assessed valuation of \$75,943.20 which is only \$513.30 less than in 1931, will raise \$2,078.70 with a levy of 27.7 which is only 2.2 mills above last year.

The state tax will be \$79,887.74, which is \$158,359.46 less than a year ago.

Current expenses for the county show an increase of \$509.58, and total \$133,054.38, where they were \$132,544.80 a year ago.

The county library fund will have \$1,759.18 less raised for it, or \$1,875.54 for this year.

The county road amount is \$27,758.25, or \$5,742.34 less than a year ago, when it was \$33,500.59.

The market road tax will amount to \$15,813.37 in 1932, which is \$2,449.85 less than a year ago.

The county high school's share has mounted \$4,810.37 to a new high total of \$84,775.19 for 1932.

County schools will raise \$8,591.38 more than a year ago and \$155,296.13 will go to that purpose.

The county fair will receive \$172.85 more than last year, and will get \$6,376.83 tax money in 1932.

The road bond sinking fund requires \$695.56 more tax money, and \$122,661.44 will be raised this year.

The general warrant bond sinking fund will receive \$199.56 less than in 1931, or \$7,877.34.

General warrant redemption bond interest will get \$1,376, or \$3,945.76 less than a year ago.

Union High School District No. 1 will get \$5,908.52 or \$178.21 less than in 1931.

Union High School District No. 2 will receive \$78,010.54 which is \$5,927.49 more than a year ago.

Union High School District No. 3 has cut its budget \$4,708.26 and will levy \$1,744.61.

Union High School District No. 4 asks \$394.82 more than in 1931 and will receive \$1,945.59.

The county unit budget has been reduced \$17,514.74 to \$95,494.69 for 1932 taxes.

School District No. 1 has reduced its budget \$57,330.15 and will raise \$52,481.35 where \$109,811.50 was raised in 1931.

School District No. 8 has received \$1,759.54 which is \$214.52 above 1931 taxes.

School District No. 2 has reduced its budget to \$5,416.54 which is \$557.10 less than a year ago.

School District No. 9 asks \$1,283.32 which is \$996.28 less than last year.

School District No. 28 has a budget of \$7,329.59 which is \$3,758.07 more than last year's budget.

School District No. 23 will raise \$11,347.35, which is a saving of \$4,110.99 over the last year's budget of \$15,458.37.

at the League of Nations council, who has been appointed foreign minister in the cabinet of his father-in-law, Premier Inukai. M. Yoshizawa is on his way from Paris.

Meanwhile, the foreign office has decided the Stimson note is a formal communication and requires a reply, but the position is being taken that the American secretary of state actually did not invoke the nine power pact, but simply reminded Japan of her obligations under it.

ROME, Jan. 9. (AP)—It is believed in diplomatic circles that Italy has decided to support the American action in invoking the nine power pact in the Far East.

The only statement from the foreign office, however, was that a copy of the American note to Japan had been received and that an answer would be sent today.

The statement gave no indication as to whether Italy's action would be identical with that of the United States.

LONDON, Jan. 9. (AP)—Great Britain is not following the lead of the United States in invoking the nine power pact in Manchuria, a foreign office statement said today.

While the British government stands by the policy of the open door for international trade in Manchuria, the statement said, it has not considered it necessary to present any formal note to Japan, since that country recently reiterated its adherence to the open door policy.

Suit has been filed in circuit court by B. S. Grigsby against Roy G. Miller, Klamath county, et al. The plaintiff is suing for foreclosure of mortgage on properties located on the recently constructed section of The Dallas-California highway from the city limits of Klamath Falls to a point beyond Pelican City.

The complaint alleges that Grigsby lent the defendant, Miller, the sum of \$5,000, which was secured by a mortgage on the property designated. Other of the defendants named in the complaint loaned Miller a sum on a second mortgage on the land. The plaintiff asks to have all secondary claims set aside, and to have the land sold to pay the first mortgage. He also asks for \$500 attorney fees, and for costs and disbursements in the case.

an officer of the local court and will be in charge of the prisoners.

Lieut. Massie gave his age as 22, Mrs. Fortescue said she was 49 and Lord said he was 21.

Shot at Massie's Home

Meanwhile officers took into custody A. L. Jones, an enlisted man whose home is in N. 7 Bedford, Mass., for questioning.

Police said they believed the Hawaiian was shot in Massie's home and that the body was taken to Koko Head in an automobile. They said they suspected that Jones had been on guard outside the house when the Hawaiian was killed.

Deputy Sheriff Hooper and a coroner advanced the theory that the Hawaiian was held under water in a bathtub to deaden the sound of the revolver report when it was discharged. This would explain the fact that the man's clothing was wet when it was found.

Lieut. Massie is a son of W. S. Massie of Winchester, Ky. Territorial executive, who were openly hostile between the citizens of mixed races, would be aligned against military and naval forces in the Hawaiian islands.

Both territorial and army and navy officials have been striving to avert open hostilities between service men and civilians inflamed by various "reprisal" attacks between the two groups following the failure of a jury to convict the five men who allegedly attacked Mrs. Massie. The jury disagreed and the defendants were released on bail pending the second trial.

Naval authorities suggested tonight that the best way to insure safety for Mrs. Fortescue, Lieut. Massie and Lord would be to place them in confinement on an American warship anchored off Pearl Harbor.

The trio was questioned in the county attorney's office shortly before the charges were filed.

The man believed to be Kahahawai was shot through the heart. His head was beaten to make positive identification difficult, and he was wrapped in a sheet like a mummy. Apparently the slayers intended to lower his body into a water geyser at Koko Head, near here, and forever hide the crime.

Officials announced that each of the three persons arrested was non-committal, and on minor points told conflicting stories. Mrs. Fortescue admitted she had parked her car in front of the Federal building, from the steps of which Kahahawai was kidnapped this morning, according to his step-brother, Edward Ulli. She said she had gone there for the purpose of purchasing stamps, and would make no other admission.

While she was being interrogated, Mrs. Massie and her sister appeared at the attorney's office. They were granted permission to talk to their mother.

Plans had been made to hold Mrs. Fortescue, Lieut. Massie and Lord in Oahu prison so that they could be protected against any possible uprising. It was learned, however, that a court

order would be necessary to confine them in the prison, and suggestion was then made to put them on the war ship.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. (AP)—The navy announced today that fleet maneuvers will be carried on off the Hawaiian Islands as scheduled, but officers and men will not be given shore leave at Honolulu because of disorders there.

Admiral Pratt, chief of naval operations, instructed Admiral Schofield, commander-in-chief of the fleet, to sail immediately after completing the maneuvers February 11 to Lahaina Roads, 12 miles southeast of Honolulu on the island of Maui.

These instructions went forward today as the result of an outbreak of crime involving attacks on white women, among them the wife of a young naval officer, in Honolulu.

FRIDAY HAS BEST RECORD FOR YEAR

Friday, a Holstein cow owned by C. W. Lewis, of Merrill, holds the high county record for 1931, with a total production of 15,540 pounds of milk and 116.5 pounds of butterfat registered during the year, according to Earl Gardiner, tester for the Klamath Cow Testing association.

Friday also holds a state record for production of butterfat with a total of 1349 pounds of fat and 2453 pounds of milk produced during the month of May, 1931.

"Bess," a Holstein owned by E. T. McLaughlin, of Pine Grove, is a second high cow in Klamath county during 1931, producing 19,358 pounds of milk and 659.9 pounds of butterfat.
