

COUNTY CLERK REREGISTERS CITY VOTERS

All registered voters in Klamath Falls will receive cards from the office of County Clerk C. H. Delap the end of this week, giving their home address and precinct number.

The addition of two precincts to the city of Klamath Falls, making 25 precincts in all, and the changing of the boundaries of other precincts makes the re-registration of all voters necessary.

The voting list was checked with the postoffice mailing list, and the official postoffice home addresses of voters was taken as the proper address.

Voters who do not receive cards will know that they are not registered and on the voting list, and they must register or re-register if they expect to vote in the May primary election. Those who receive cards that do not give their correct residential address should also re-register at the clerk's office, the clerk states.

Stirling's report continued: "When the men had completed their act, one pointed out the general direction of the road and they got into their car and left."

She later suffered infection from her broken jaw and ran a fever from 101 to 104 degrees for two weeks."

HONOLULU, Jan. 11. (AP)—Island law unraveled today to restore calm and preserve order in a city horrified first by attacks upon white women and now by an amazing murder.

United States soldiers waited in readiness for emergency orders. Eleven leaves of service men were cancelled. White women vented upon the streets only with utmost caution. A marked tension gripped the city.

Navy Holds Men

At the Pearl Harbor naval base the navy held three of the four persons charged with the slaying of Joseph Kahahawai, Hawaiian.

Those under arrest and charged with first degree murder are: Lieut. Thomas H. Masie, U. S. N., whose wife recently was assaulted, allegedly by Kahahawai and four others.

Mrs. Granville Fortescue, mother-in-law of Masie and wife of a prominent soldier and author.

E. J. Lord, navy enlisted man. Albert O. Jones, navy enlisted man.

Jones is held by civil police in jail here, although city and county attorney James P. Gilliland endorsed the navy's action in assuming custody of the other three saying they were "safer from reprisal aboard a warship at Pearl Harbor than in the Honolulu jail."

To Demand Deaths

They were Corporal Fred Reiter, 24, stationed at the Washington navy yard, and Private Chas. Leo Mutchler, also 24, of the marine barracks here.

MILK MEETING ON SLATE FOR MONDAY

For the purpose of establishing better relations between individuals in the Klamath Milk Producers and the Klamath Milk Distributors Associations, a two meeting are scheduled for today, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson.

Milk producers were scheduled to meet at 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon in the office of the county agent, while the distributors will meet Monday night at 7:30 o'clock at the Willard Hotel.

Both milk organizations were recently organized, and temporary officers are serving in each. It is hoped that complete organization will be effected in each group and that workable organizations will be secured.

children and to take a greater interest in what they are doing. The chief warned against the practice of allowing youngsters between 14 and 16 of age attend dances without an older person, and often without an escort of any kind. There is far too much of this done in Klamath Falls, the chief said.

Sergeant Cook appealed for a city-wide effort to improve traffic conditions, and pointed to the fact that in 1931 Klamath Falls leads the whole United States in the number of traffic deaths per capita. A national safety campaign is being organized, he said, and Klamath Falls records will be kept for comparison at the end of the next year "if there are any people left in town after another year of such hazards."

The sergeant spoke enthusiastically of the improvement in parking conditions last Saturday, and described the beginning of the campaign to improve the traffic situation. He gave credit to The Herald and News for their editorial program in connection with the situation.

Cook told of his efforts in the schools to teach children to avoid accidents and to keep off the streets. He warned motorists against leaving their automobiles unlocked on the streets.

The meeting ended with another short talk by Chief Merrill in which he praised Klamath Falls as the city in Oregon reporting the least crime for its size in the past few months.

were flying over blinds on their way to and from the feeding grounds. During the first weeks of the pick-up work, Warrenton placed the birds in open pens at Tule Lake. After a few days in these pens, the birds gained sufficient strength to fly out and return to the lake.

Worcester found, however, that within a few days these birds had again become so weak that they were unable to secure food, and after this he clipped one wing on each bird to keep them in captivity until they had completely recovered.

All of the living birds salvaged at the rescue camp are being placed in pens located on Link River. They receive water from a number of warm springs which flow through the pens. To date the loss of crippled ducks has been approximately 30 per cent of the total number placed in the pens. There has been only a 10 per cent loss of the salvaged geese placed in the government pens.

GRAIN VALUES UP ON SUPPLY NEWS

CHICAGO, Jan. 11. (AP)—Late bulges in grain values resulted today from stock market rallies and from 1,183,000 bushels decrease of the United States wheat visible supply.

The visible supply decrease contrasted with an increase of 1,774,000 bushels at this time last year. Primary domestic receipts of wheat continued to be surprisingly small, and this circumstance more than offset dearth of export demand.

Wheat closed firm 1/4-1/2 higher than Saturday's finish, corn 1/4-1/2 up, oats unchanged to 1/2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 5 cents.
