

KLAMATH BASIN RECOMMENDED TO POULTRYMEN

Increase in poultry production in the Klamath Basin has not kept pace with consumption of poultry products, according to bulletins issued by the county agent's office in conjunction with the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

While the total value of all poultry products produced within the county is approximately \$200,000 per year, the value of poultry products consumed is still considerably in excess of \$200,000, figures show. Production, no doubt, does not exceed 50 per cent of consumption.

Poultry production has been increasing relatively slowly in the past two years, while population growth has been the most rapid in history.

At the present time increased production is not keeping pace with increased consumption. This condition makes Klamath county the ideal location for poultrymen, the bulletin states.

Climatic conditions are favorable for all breeds, with White Leghorns predominating at the present time. U. S. weather records show an abundance of clear days with a light annual rainfall of less than 15 inches. Winter weather in the Klamath Basin is not particularly severe, with clear sunny days and freezing nights as the rule.

Soil throughout the Basin is mainly well drained sandy loam, which combined with sunshine and light rainfall, keeps disease down to a minimum and puts sanitation within the easy control of the poultryman.

A local cooperative egg marketing association was put in operation in 1929 and is now of considerable service to poultrymen in disposing of their products. Egg prices usually remain higher in Klamath Falls and surrounding territory, than in other sections of the state. The association is putting out eggs of high quality bringing a premium over inferior eggs shipped in from other points. Membership is increasing rapidly in the association and no doubt a receiving and handling station will be built during this year.

"How come?" asked the officer.

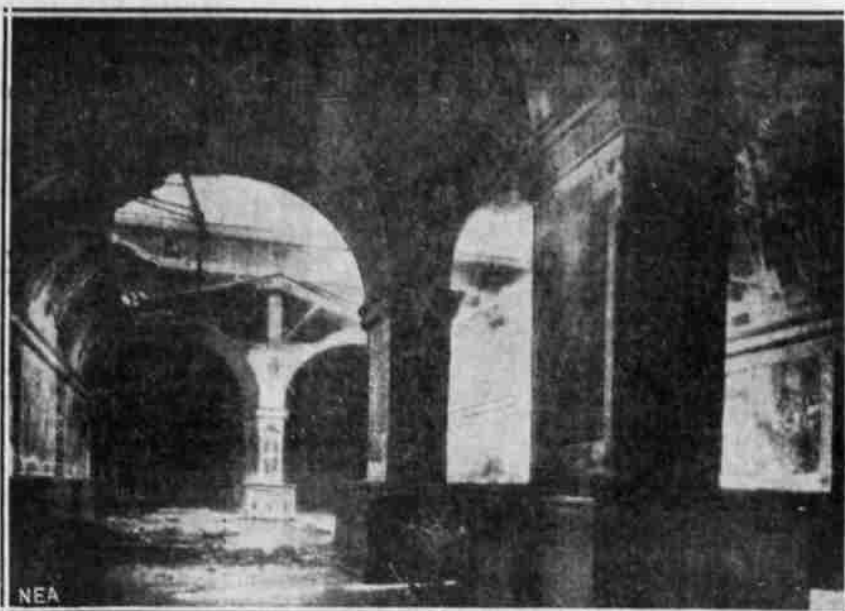

NEW PONTIACS WIN INTEREST AT SHOW

Smartly styled and brilliantly engineered, the two 1932 Pontiacs introduced Thursday are attracting wide attention at the New York automobile show and in dealers showrooms.

The 1932 models are offered in two series—a low-priced six, larger and more powerful than before, with a wheel base increased to 114 inches—and an \$5 horsepower V-eight, on a 117-inch wheel base.

Spirited power and pick-up and sustained top speed are provided by high-compression engines which operate on regular grades of fuel. Other mechanical advantages include a combination of synchromesh transmission and quiet second gear with controlled free wheeling which may be locked out at will. Ride control on all models at no extra cost is rendered even more effective by rubber cushioning at 47 points throughout the chassis, which insulates engine, frame, springs, axles and body, absorbing minor shocks and deadening noise.

Choice of six new Fisher body types is offered on each chassis. Low, stream-lined, chrome-trimmed, and with slanting, unobstructed windshields, their attractive design has drawn much favorable comment.

On both six and eight, the radiators are sharply V-shaped and carry a built-in grille with vertical chromed bars. Headlamps are anchored directly on the deep-ly-crowned front fenders which also support the smart indicator lamps that serve as a warning side light for cross traffic and also reveal the full width of the car to approaching drivers.

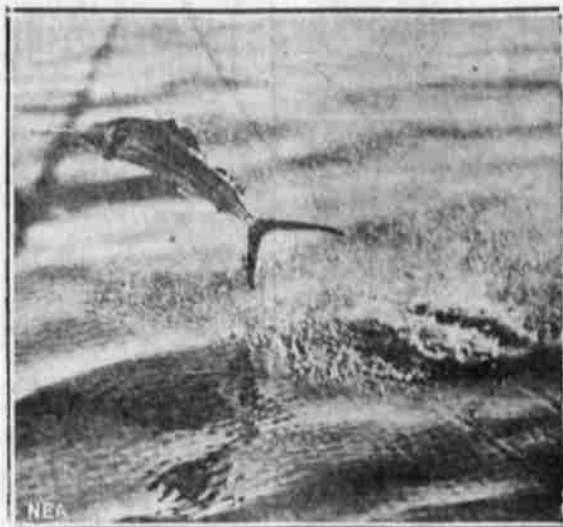
The effect of stability is heightened by the low hang of the rear fenders, by small wheels with large tires and hubcaps and by full-width chromed single-bar bumpers. On the eight and on the sport and custom model of the six, an added touch of smartness is provided by twin trumpet horns and twin rear lamps, all finished entirely in chrome.

Pontiac's combination of synchromesh transmission and free wheeling has eliminated all shifting difficulties. Whether the car is in free-wheeling or not, the synchromesh always functions—the driver cannot clash the gears. But in addition to the silence of synchromesh, he enjoys also the greater shifting convenience of free-wheeling. After starting the car "in low," the driver may forget the clutch pedal, for the free-wheeling clutch automatically disengages when the accelerator is released, permitting the gears to be shifted without touching the clutch. Steering is equally easy, and the big, self-energizing Bendix brakes gives full control at all speeds.

Reliability is assured in the engine of both series by full pressure lubrication to every moving part, including the piston pins, which receive oil through rifle-drilled connecting rods. All engine parts are fitted to close limits, especially the electro-plated pistons, which are balanced in production and installed individually by hand.
