

DIEGEL LEADS IN CALIENTE GOLF TOURNEY

AGUA CALIENTE, Mex., Jan. 15. (AP)—Leo Diegel served notice today that he contemplated saving the Agua Caliente \$15,000 open championship for Hala, California as it passed the half-way mark.

But this was not all. Harry Cooper, the confident former Texan, now of Chicago, and Fred Morrison, Culver City, Calif., muddered, who held the upper hand after the first eighteen holes, were close to the top with 143's. Light Horse Harry had a 71 on the second round and par 72 on the start.

Morrison couldn't locate the greens with his iron yesterday. And after he did find them his putts wouldn't go down. As a result he ended up with a 74, two over par and five strokes removed from his first round score.

Hagen In Form
Diegel's was not the only 68 yesterday. Paul Runyon of White Plains, N. Y., one of the rising generation, surprised everyone, including himself, with two nice hole cards of 34, each two strokes to the good over par.

The threats did not end with the 142's. Tied with Runyon at 144 was Walter Hagen, who appears to be in the best form of any of his annual western invasions. The Hag missed a long putt by inches for a 69 yesterday, to score 74-70 for the 26 holes. He is playing his approach well and his putting is the best he has yet displayed in these parts.

But if he adheres to the rule that he can't use his state-owned car after five in the afternoon he will have to spend the night in Medford and then spend the better part of the next morning getting over to Klamath Falls.

WE have a name, which we apply more or less in a spirit of contempt, to such rules. We call them "red tape," and the cartoonists are fond of depicting public employees so smothered up in red tape that they can't move efficiently about their tasks.

HOTELS of the Northwest, we read in the papers, are talking of accepting Canadian money at par this summer in payment for rooms and meals, hoping that in this way they will be able to stimulate tourist travel by Canadians in this country.

If the hotels act on this suggestion, here is what will happen: You and I, when we contemplate traveling, will go to our bank and buy Canadian money at the prevailing exchange discount of about 20 per cent, thus getting Canadian dollars for around 80 cents each.

We will then use these 80-cent Canadian dollars to pay our hotel bills.

IN that event, you see, one of two things must happen.

Either the hotels must reconcile themselves to a 20 per cent reduction in the gold value of the services they are selling, or they must say to themselves:

"Look here; this Canadian money that we're getting is worth 20 per cent less than the American money we were getting before. We can't stand any more reduction as that. What we've got to do is to RAISE OUR PRICES to make up for the reduction in the value of the money we're getting in payment for our services."

YOU may say: "I don't travel much, so your story about hotels and Canadian money doesn't interest me."

Listen:

A lot of people are telling us that we of the United States ought to go off the gold standard, thus reducing the value of our money by taking away from it the privilege of exchange for gold.

If that should happen, the result in all lines of business would be exactly the same as in the case of the hotels that accept Canadian money in payment of their bills.

THAT is to say, the dollar you receive in wages would be worth, say, only 80 cents. So you would either have to have an increase in wages or you would have to get along on less in return for your money.

There is no such thing, you see, as something for nothing. We can't make everybody prosperous merely by waving a magic wand.

"2—Recovery is possible, on a sound money basis without recourse to monetary panaceas, but—

"4—The depression will not care itself, and requires prompt, intelligent and vigorous action." Then the economists recommend the four following steps:

"1—The enactment of the bill establishing the reconstruction finance corporation to deal more effectively with emergency situations;

"2—Proper economy in municipal, state and national budgets and increased taxation;

"3—A liberal federal reserve policy, designed to check credit contraction and encourage some expansion;

"4—A commercial banking policy co-operating with the reserve banks in checking credit decrease and encouraging increases, including:

"(A)—An increase in sound investments.

"(B)—Co-operation in aiding necessary treasury financing.

"(C)—Borrowing from federal reserve banks when necessary to meet these and other needs."

They express the conviction that prosecution of these policies is sound, involves no important risks, and should exert powerful pressure toward these four ends:

"1—Stopping the downward trend of prices.

"2—Returning hoarded money to the banks.

"3—Restoring the normal value of securities, and

"4—Starting the beginning of business recovery.
