Billy Howell Regains Lost Weight, Plans New Attack on Nation's Amateur Golf Crowns

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 15. (AP)—A heavier and more muscular Billy Howell is preparing for the golf wars of 1932. He is hitting the new ball a little further and a little straighter than ever.

Regains Lost Weight
He lost 28 pounds in six 1931 tournaments, he has regained all that lost weight and added about ten pounds more while concentrating now on his responsibilities as a senior at Washington and Lee University. He is only 15.

Billy plays golf whenever he gets the chance. During the Christmas season, his father says, he shot "great golf." He was eight under par for four rounds.

He likes swimming and dancing. He stands well up in his class as a student. After leaving Washington and Lee he expects to enter business with his father, a hardware merchant.

Survives "Big Year"
Billy survived his "big year" and all the tumult of home town enthusiasm for his exploits without having his head turned. He was just as much surprised when he got home to get a tremendous welcome and the gift of a new car, as he was to step bashfully into the press tent at Beverly last September and find the experts writing thousands of words about him. His friendly "Bos-

well," Paul Ferris, helped him over the hurdles of publicity. Confidence of any golf course, plus ability to concentrate, is typical of this youthful star. Going to the 34th and next to last hole of his match with Outmet, Howell remarked to a friend an U. S. G. A. official: "I'm not licked yet." He was one down. A screaming iron split the pin and the hole was halved.

Billy is out for more trophies this season. Graduation will prevent a defense of his middle Atlantic title, but he will defend his old dominion and Virginia amateur crowns. He also expects to enter the Southern conference tournament, the inter-collegiate, the Southern amateur and National amateur.

GERMANY WILLING FOR COMPROMISE

BERLIN, Jan. 15. (AP)—The German government is willing to compromise on reparations payments.

Although Chancellor Heinrich Brüning has declared the nation's inability to make any payments, the United Press was informed today that the government will agree to a six-months prolongation of the present moratorium rather than immediate cancellation. The moratorium expires July 1.

Furthermore, recent informal negotiations have envisaged fixing 500,000,000 marks (about \$125,000,000) annually as the total of German payments as compared to the average annual payment of \$473,000,000 under the Young plan.

Miami Racing Meet Opened by Crowd of 15,000

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 15. (AP)—Joseph E. Widener and his associates of the Miami Racing association were host to a throng of 15,000 racing enthusiasts on Thursday, at the opening of the 39-day winter meeting at Hialeah park.

The course, dotted with full-grown, transplanted palms and beautiful beds of flowers, is the last word in modern landscaping. The program carried a double feature and five high class commission events, and produced some brilliant contests. The inaugural handicap, which netted the winner \$2,490, was the high spot of the entertainment, and drew a field of seven to dispute the issue over a six furlong route. John J. Curtis' Flying Heels, under top weight of 124 pounds, won the inaugural.
