Camp Fire Secretary Lauds Activities of Girls' Group As Constructive Recreation

Nearly 100 residents of Klamath Falls were present at a dinner at Hotel Willard, Friday evening, to hear a talk by Miss Edith Kempthorne, national field secretary of the Camp Fire Girls, who is in the city from New York to conduct the Guardians' Institute.

"Will adolescents take as their model for their leisure the lives of the so-called rich, and procure for themselves as much of display, feeding, drinking, gambling, travel as they are able, merely for continuous excitement and the playing of games to kill idle time, or will they spend it in the way of the idle poor, the unemployed, in stagnation, physically, mentally or morally, or a mixture of the two, stagnation relieved by a fever does of external cash to purchase?"

Question Answered

This question asked by Dr. L. P. Jacks, dean of Manchester college, Oxford, who had devoted a great deal of his thought and time to the study of the problem of recreation for boys and girls, was answered by Miss Kempthorne, by a threefold NO—not if young girls are able to avail themselves of such a program of creative activities as Camp Fire offers.

She pointed out that games, handicraft, swimming, camping, singing, learning about nature, dramatics, are only some of the activities which represent the Camp Fire good times—joyous use of leisure out of which grow the habits and attitudes which make for some character, good citizenship and happy living.

Theodore Roosevelt was a firm believer in education through recreation, said Miss Kempthorne, and quoted him as follows:

"In our family we always regarded our father and mother as foreordained through the ages to be our playmates and our companions. This is what counted, I believe, in my life more than anything else—this com-

munal play and association.

"Often our communal play would take us outdoors in a family picnic or a camping trip. We would row out to Lloyd's Neck. Then we would take blankets and bacon and eggs, and we would catch a few little fish. After supper we would spend the night on the end of Lloyd's Neck with the mosquitoes if the wind didn't blow and without the mosquitoes, if it did blow."

"Sometimes we would take a 'squaw trip,' which meant that we took the little girls of the family as well as the boys. Now all this sounds as if it were simply pleasure. Wrong. It was character building."

Lester F. Scott, national executive of the Camp Fire Girls' organization, sent the following message:

Primary Interest

"The acquiring of varied personal interests should be one of the primary objects of education. Parents and teachers should regard it as an important part of training to enlarge the interests of the child. This should be the aim of everyone in his own self-training. These interests should include the home, the family, the community as well as nature, art, science and religion."

"Our program, rightly interpreted, spreads before the girl a carefully selected age of activities, all interesting, all vital. It is your function as guardians to guide that selection. It is yours also to encourage the girl as she constructs for herself, through experiment and experience a standard of taste, a basis of selection of interests, of activities, which shall be to her of lasting value in her adult life."

The national secretary was welcomed to Klamath Falls by Mr. Paul T. Jackson, and was introduced by Miss Rita Farr, who is chairman of the guardians in Klamath. The invocation was given by Rev. A. Theodore Smith, who also gave a short talk at the close of the program. Members of the Kiwanis club

which has done a great deal for this organization of girls, were present and sang one of their songs. Group singing was led by Miss Lillie Darby, with Mrs. Madge Hampton at the piano. Mrs. E. W. Merceus was in charge of arrangements for the institute which opens this morning.
