HOOVER CONSIDERS M'NARY FOR POST

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. (UP) Chief Justice Benjamin Nathan Cardozo of the New York court of appeals was understood to be receiving President Hoover's principal consideration for the supreme court vacancy created by Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes' retirement.

PORTLAND, Jan. 15. (UP)—Senator Charles McNary of Oregon is being seriously considered by President Hoover to succeed Justice Holmes on the supreme court bench, according to a dispatch tonight to the Journal by its Washington correspondent.

The west already has two members of the court, but the Pacific coast is not represented. McNary is said to fill the requirements chiefly in the mind of the president—he is from the west, is a republican and a liberal.

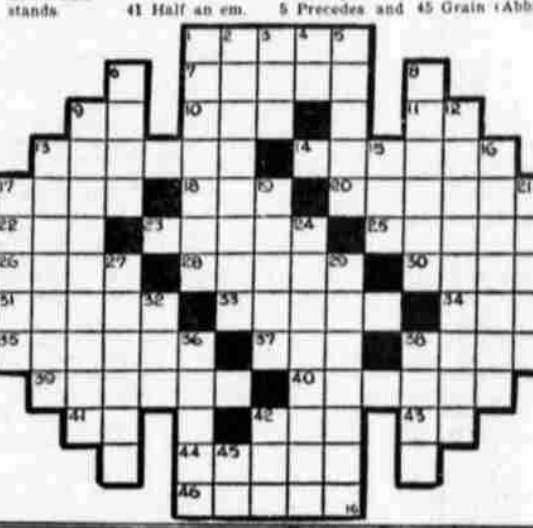

Winnie Judd Goes On Trial Tuesday
PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 16. (UP)—"Winsome Winnie" Judd, who took a 500-mile train ride with the dismembered bodies of her victims, will go to trial next Tuesday charged with the murder of her two girl friends, Miss Hedvig Samuelson, 25, and Mrs. Agnes Lerot, 27.
The 27-year-old copper blonde brutally killed both young women after one had threatened to tell a man friend something to her disadvantage. Admitting both killings, she probably will contend that she shot in self-defense, was insane, or both. Insanity may be offered as one of several defenses, under Arizona law.
