At every point represented by a dot, and at hundreds of others, there is a United Press correspondent. Each star represents a bureau or central office where news is edited. Expert news executives in these seventy-four bureaus are directing the work of combing the world for news and COMBINING THE NEWS FOR TRUTH.

Cable lines over which the news is flashed across the ocean are also indicated on the map. Besides the cables and the leased telegraph wires, which pour news constantly into the office of this newspaper, the United Press uses all of the principal wireless systems, commercial telegraphs, telephones—every modern method of fast communication—to bring you the latest news immediately.
