FARM ECONOMIST VISITS KLAMATH

Dr. E. A. White, nationally known economist and expert on electrical and agricultural affairs, was a visitor in Klamath Falls Saturday, departing last night for San Francisco, enroute to his headquarters in Chicago.

Dr. White is a national director of the committee on the relation of electricity to agriculture. This committee is made up of members of the American farm bureau, national grange, department of agriculture and other farm units, and the national electric light association which is composed entirely of manufacturers and power companies. He has been a director of this group for eight years and assists in conducting experiments and investigations to determine the type of electrical equipment which can advantageously be used on farms.

LAKEVIEW CHAMBER OFFICERS ELECTED

LAKEVIEW, Ore. (Special)—B. K. Snyder, Gene Pavell, E. A. Fetsch, J. J. Van Keulen, Zim Haldwin, Dr. H. E. Kelly, A. L. Thornton, Vint Miller and C. J. Claus have been elected officers of the Lake county chamber of commerce for 1932. All of the group with the exception of Mr. Claus served on the board during 1931.

The annual report of the secretary covering 1931 shows that the chamber accomplished a great deal during the past year, and started several projects under way which should bear fruit during 1932.

The chamber played an active part in obtaining Oddie-Colton funds for the Lakeview-Burns highway; the chamber was reorganized early last spring and placed upon a sound financial basis through contributions that totaled a little more than \$2,500; the chamber succeeded in having more than 200,000 fish planted during the year in the lakes and streams within the county, and personally attended to stocking Dog Lake with black bass; Senator Steiwer, President Hamilton of the state chamber; Frank Jenkins of the Southern Oregon Publishing company, President Hall of the University of Oregon and other prominent men were brought in during the year to speak before chamber meetings.

Altogether, 43 tasks of importance were successfully accomplished during 1931. The new board will meet within the next few days and announce its policies and prepare the new budget.

LAKE COUNTY MEN ASK GRAZING AREA

LAKEVIEW, Ore. (Special)—Many Lake county livestock men have joined in a petition to Oregon's delegation in congress requesting that one or more livestock grazing districts be created by the federal government with the two million acres of unappropriated federal land in northern and eastern Lake county.

The livestock men claim that the land is unfit for homesteading; that due to unrestricted grazing the federal land is overgrazed and the herbage is rapidly being destroyed. If grazing districts are created the government will lease large areas and use the grazing fees in sinking wells or impounding water and in supervising the territory to prevent the range is no longer overstocked.

At the present time the federal government receives no compensation from the ranchers whose sheep and cattle are pastured on the unappropriated land. The petitioners assert that both the government and the livestock men would profit if grazing districts were established.

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MARTIN CONVICTED OF LAW VIOLATION

BIEBER, Calif. (Special)—Ed Martin of Montgomery Creek, a lumberman, was convicted by a jury in justice court here of failure to post notice of payday at a lumber yard he operated in Bieber last spring. The jury found Martin not guilty of failure to maintain a semi-monthly payday as required by the state wage law.

The complainant on both charges was J. P. Laudert, who testified that he worked for Martin at Bieber and Nubieber from last February 23 to June 10, and that he had \$303 coming in unpaid wages and costs of his attempts to collect them. He has a civil suit against Martin pending in district court at Susanville.

Martin in defense pleaded inability to pay and testified that he owed a lumber company \$48,000. He moved his lumber yard from Bieber to Nubieber and afterward sold it.
