heaviest snowfall of any point in the United States where a highway is kept open throughout the winter.
Its heaviest recorded snowfall was in the winter of 1927-28, when the total was a few inches under 37 feet. To date this winter, the snow precipitation amounts to a trifle under 17 feet.
This is more than the total snowfall on Sun Creek mountain all of last winter, and basing his estimate on the month-to-month figures of 1927-28 Captain Seely thinks it not improbable that there will be a total precipitation this winter of some 30 feet.
This gives an idea of the much better water conditions that may be expected next summer in this country.
At the present moment, the entire highway north from here is covered with snow, which varies from a few inches in Klamath Falls to some five or six feet of settled snow at the summit. On the long jackpine flat north of the mountain, the snow runs somewhere from two to three feet in depth.
It is a fascinatingly beautiful sight, especially just after a fresh snowfall. The jackpine country north of the mountain is infinitely more beautiful in winter than in summer.
Picture to yourself the high summit of the Cascades, mantled in snow now from top to bottom, with Mount Pitt and Mount Thielsen gleaming white and pure off to the west.
All around you, the pine trees are loaded with snow, and ahead of you on the long tangents stretches a straight, smooth-shoveled path, disappearing in the far, white distance. This path is the highway.
It is kept shoveled out smoothly by snowplows, which work 24 hours a day when the snow is falling, experience having taught that the way to keep
