ADDISON, N. Y., Jan. 18, (UP)—Five persons were killed and five injured when an automobile crowded with home-comingers from a country dance crashed into an Erie railway passenger train at the Main street crossing here Saturday.

Four of the dead were members of one family. They were Arthur Woodbeck, 30; Ruth Woodbeck, 24, his wife, and two of their children, Elsie, 4, and Floyd, 3. Harold Sanford, 27, a friend of the Woodbecks, was the fifth fatality.

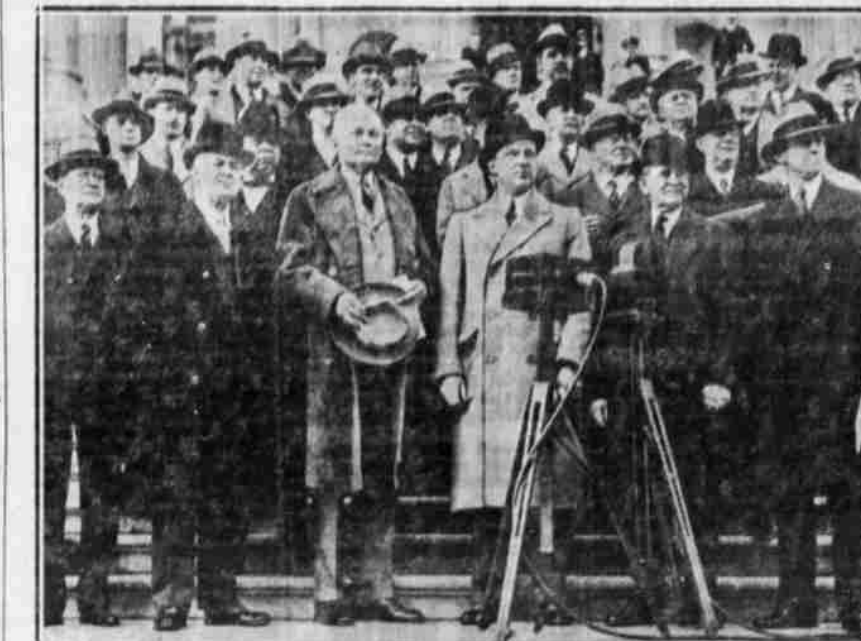
The injured were the three remaining Woodbeck children, Charles, 8; Arthur, Jr., 6, and Harry, 2; William Woodbeck, brother of the dead man and driver of the automobile, and Henry Smith, 17.

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Jan. 18, (UP)—Search was being made tonight for two handits who held up and robbed Rex Bell, cowboy film actor, of \$800 which he and his wife, Clara Bow, had won on the dice tables of the Boulder club here early this morning.

With the "it" girl shooting the dice, Bell and Miss Bow had won consistently during the play. He was just leaving the

gambling casino when two men accosted him in the street and told him to "come along."

The robbers returned a few personal trinkets and overlooked a \$2,000 diamond ring which Bell wore on his finger.

BROWN RECOVERING

NEW YORK, Jan. 18, (UP)—Al Brown of Panama, world's bantamweight champion, who was operated on today for a groin injury, was reported as "doing nicely" tonight by physicians at a hospital.

Brown's injuries, it was said, were caused by low blows received in a bout with "Newsboy" Brown of Los Angeles three weeks ago.

REFUGEES GATHER IN RELIEF CAMPS

CLARKSDALE, Miss., Jan. 18, (UP)—Three thousand refugees crowded half a dozen relief camps or huddled together on spots of high land over this flood-ravaged section tonight.

All were cold and hungry. Conditions were described as "ter too much for the Red Cross and other relief agencies that tried to cope with them."

"These people are going to starve to death unless something is done quickly," Jake Weinstein, chairman of the Red Cross at Charleston said.

"There is not enough food for the hundreds of refugees here; reports have come in from eight Tallahatchie county towns that there are people crowding the railroad tracks and the dry levees who have been without food for 48 hours," he said.

GREENWOOD, Miss., Jan. 18 (UP)—Crumbling levees in the road Tallahatchie river valley tonight threatened additional breaks and added flood damage. Hundreds of persons fled their homes today after six breaks in the valley's levee system were reported. Many hundred others tonight waited rescue by workers who are penetrating flooded districts in motor launches, paddle boats, skiffs and canoes.

One huge levee system which jutted out of the foothills below Charleston to Tippie in the central part of Tallahatchie county was abandoned.

The eastern bulwarks were soggy with rains and the edge of the levee had been indented by the strong current. The breaks came rapid. Two occurred last night, one being near Swan Lake, where the Grassy Lake levee burst. The gap torn in the dike let water flow over thousands of acres and a half dozen tiny towns stood in the path of flood waters.

Near Charleston, about the same time, the Patterson Bayou levee burst. Today the Grassy Lake dike gave way in another spot and three new breaks in the Patterson dike came.

Young Hoover



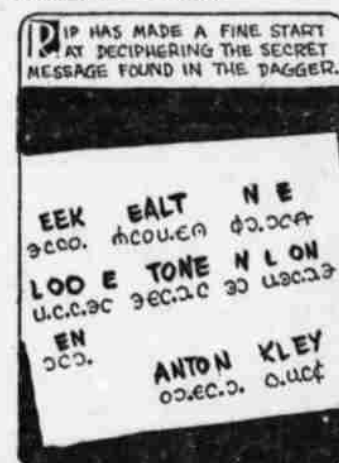

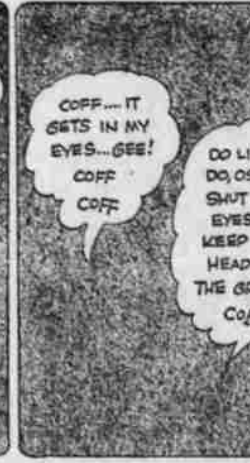
