Both are happy and fortunate old men, for both have lived to an unusual age and have retained their capacity to work and accomplish.

Without that capacity, extreme age is a calamity.

SUPPOSE someone should ask you this question: "How long do you want to live?" What would you answer?

If you are wise, your answer would be: "Only as long as I can enjoy life."

GILBERT N. TUCKER, ex-editor of the Country Gentleman and the son of its founder, dies at the age of 87. Throughout a considerable part of his long life, he was an active opponent of irrigation in the West.

If his spirit, hovering somewhere off in space, looks down and sees here in the West the happy homes and the pleasant country that without irrigation would still be a desert, it must be forced to confess: "I was wrong!"

THE East, so very, very often, has been wrong about the West. When it was first proposed, for example, to bring the country west of the Rockies under the American flag, men arose in congress and proclaimed that it was a land of rocks and desert, the whole of it not worth a dollar.

Crater Lake Ski Carnival to Climax Winter Sports

FORT KLAMATH, Ore., Jan. 19.—The climax of snow sports on the Pacific coast, the sixth annual winter sports carnival of the Crater Lake Ski club will be held February 21, featuring a 22 mile race to Crater Lake. This race is attracting some of the best known ski artists in the west, is the longest of its kind in the world and this year is expected to present competition overshadowing that of any previous event.

Preparations are underway to provide for the entertainment of a record breaking attendance and present indications point toward a surprisingly large number of entrants from all parts of the country in different carnival events.

Decreased 10 Miles
The long race has been decreased by 10 miles since last year, the start and finish lines being located five miles north of Fort Klamath on the carnival playgrounds, there a ski jump and toboggan slide have been completed for early use. Formerly the race began and finished within the town boundaries but was changed to centralize sports activities.

A silver loving cup, 38 inches tall, similar to the one presented to Colonel Charles Lindbergh by the city of Pittsburgh, Pa., will be awarded to the winner of the century race, open to all comers. A handsome trophy will also be awarded to the winner of second

BOOTLEGGING OF DEER MEAT IS ALLEGATION

Suspect Taken Near Roseburg After Snow Chase.

Others Already Arrested; Man Hides at Head of Stouts Creek.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 19. (AP)—The breaking of what state police believe was a commercialized venison distributing ring was announced here today with the arrest of Hinger Olinghouse, resident of the Cow Creek section, who is charged with possession of venison. He was brought to Roseburg at 3 a. m. today.

Olinghouse's arrest followed that of Kenneth Huntley and Isham Bradley of Portland on Dec. 30. Police said the two men had freshly killed deer and a meat car which was allegedly operated between Douglas county and Portland where the meat was "bootlegged."

Police here said Olinghouse has been killing the deer while the Portland men transported and sold the meat. Olinghouse escaped by running barefoot out of his cabin into the snow when Huntley and Bradley were arrested. He has since been hiding at the head of Stouts Creek at the top of the divide between the South Umpqua river and Cow Creek, according to Ed Walker of Medford, district game supervisor, who led a party of five officers in the search for Olinghouse Monday.

'Normal' Precipitation in Klamath Falls is Based on Weather Records of 39 Years

What is normal precipitation, the term which finds its way every day into the weather box at the top of The Herald's front page?

That question, put to H. S. Hopkins, official hydrographer of the Klamath Reclamation project, revealed that normal precipitation in Klamath Falls is based on an average of records maintained here by the United States weather bureau for 39 years. Hopkins further provided figures which show the precipitation records for the last 20 years.

An official weather bureau was established in this city in 1893, and accurate daily records were kept until 1904 when the United States established a reclamation bureau. The weather bureau was then as now operated in connection with the Klamath Reclamation project.

In 1927 the official weather bureau was turned over to the Southern Pacific railroad, which kept the records until the end of 1928, when the bureau was again taken over by the government.

Records of weather conditions and precipitation are taken daily, and averaged by H. S. Hopkins, official hydrographer of the Klamath Reclamation project. The hydrographer takes, as well, readings of the elevation of Upper

Klamath Lake, recording its rise and fall day by day.

"Season to date," as listed in the weather box is figured from October 1.

The instruments by which Hopkins keeps records of temperature and precipitation are located at the reclamation bureau offices on Eleventh street. Records are also kept of the elevation of the Upper Klamath Lake. The California Oregon Power company recently installed a machine which gives the velocity of the wind.

UNSETTLED WEATHER STILL IN PROSPECT

Frozen Slush Makes Driving Rough; Roads in Good Condition.

After a slight climb this morning the barometer started dropping about noon today, and the weatherman gave his favorite prediction of "unsettled weather, tonight and Wednesday, with possible snow or rain, and little change in temperature."

Motorists found bad going early this morning with great hoaps of slush melted by Monday's thaw, frozen solid in the streets. A light covering of new snow added to driving hazards.

Minimum temperatures recorded for this morning were 26, and the maximum for the day 36.

Forecast for the state of Oregon predict unsettled weather, probable rains in west portion, snow in east, colder in the interior tonight; fresh northwest winds offshore, backing to southerly Wednesday.

The following road report was issued by the tourist bureau of the Klamath chamber of commerce:

WINNIE JUDD PALE, CALM AS TRIAL OPENS

Spectators Fight To Hear Murder Trial in Phoenix.

Charged With 'Trunk Killings' of Two Girl Friends.

COURT HOUSE, Phoenix, Ariz., Jan. 19. (AP)—Pale but calm, Winnie Ruth Judd, clothed in a simple dark blue dress, appeared before the Arizona bar of justice today to answer for the slaying of Agnes Anne Lerol, possibly with her life as the state questioned veniemen on capital punishment.

Thirty-five women and 27 men, the only spectators the room could accommodate, lined the walls. Would-be spectators fought at the door. Clothes were torn and faces scratched.

Bodies in Trunk

The 26-year-old confessed killer is charged with murder in the first degree in connection with the deaths of Mrs. Lerol and Selig Samuels, first her friends and then her rivals.

The bodies of the two women, Miss Samuels' dismembered, were found in two trunks and a suitcase in a Los Angeles railway station last October 19.

SCHOOL UNITY IS BOARD'S OBJECT

Recruiting Restrained In Rulings of Higher Education Body.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19. (AP)—The state board of higher education took a definite step toward unification of all colleges in Oregon as a long meeting closed here last night by appointing a committee to accomplish the task.

C. L. Starr, president of the board, named the following: Albert Hatch of Medford, R. P. Irwin of Portland, E. C. Fosse of The Dalles, E. Sammons of Portland, active members, and President Starr, ex-officio member.

No Discussion

The proposed unification was not discussed.

The board took further steps to restrict "recruiting" of high school students by University of Oregon and Oregon State college by adopting a committee report which defines the lengths each institution may go in making "contracts" with prospective students.

B. C. Dinius, representative of an eastern chemical company, today installed an auxiliary bolting system, used in banks and post offices. Two extra bolts are placed in the door of the vault, some tear gas bombs, and a wire net screen over the back of the entire door. Any attempt to use heat, tools or explosives or to tamper with the door in any other illegal manner, will cause the extra bolts to lock, relock the present bolts if they should be unlocked, turn loose the tear gas and sound an alarm.

There have been only 18 attempts, all unsuccessful, to enter post office vaults so equipped.

MAN THREATENING MOLTZNER TAKEN

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 19. (AP)—Maddened by the loss of his money in a building and loan company failure here, George Disks, 46, Aberdeen, Wash., longer, was held in jail here today after police found him in the home of Jay S. Moltzner, threatening Moltzner's life.

Disks was jailed on a charge of threatening to kill and was ordered held without bail. Police quoted him as having declared he intended to kill Moltzner and then shoot himself. When the two officers arrived, they said, they found Disks standing before Moltzner, his hand on a revolver, while Moltzner was arguing with him. It was the second attack on Moltzner within a week. He is under sentence of two years in prison in connection with the failure of the Guardian Savings and Loan association.

Disks told police he had \$2,811 in the institution when he crashed. It was the third time he lost his savings in bank failures, he related.

The officers said the logger told them "I would have let him live only if he had given me my money."

Portland Teachers Given Salary Cuts

PORTLAND, Jan. 19. (AP)—A temporary salary reduction for teachers in Portland schools, amounting to as much as 25 per cent for a four-month period, was voted by the school board here last night. The board said this step must be taken to absorb a \$267,000 deficit, attributed to tax delinquencies.

PARIS, Jan. 19. (AP)—Premier Laval, introducing his new cabinet to the chamber of deputies today, said flatly that France will not forego her right to reparations from Germany.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19. (AP)—A. H. Briggs, California state anti-saloon league superintendent, today told the national league his state would oppose "sending back to congress any man who hooks up with the Hearst-Johnson combine against President Hoover."

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19. (AP)—Although gasoline price signs at company stations read 16½ cents a gallon, motorists today found dozens of stations and garages selling motor fuel two and three cents a gallon below that level, with one station at 12.9 cents.

MANILA, Jan. 19. (AP)—The body of Mrs. Mabel Sedgewick Tait, 34, wife of Edwin E. Tait, known in Pacific coast boxing and as a far eastern carnival promoter, was found today in a fish pond at the edge of the city.

CHICAGO, Jan. 19. (AP)—An offer to trade a 10 per cent cut in pay for a 10 per cent increase in jobs has been laid before the nation's railroads by their 2,000,000 workers.

STIMSON WILL LEAD GENEVA ARMS ENVOYS

Retiring Ambassador To Be President of Finance Corporation.

Eugene Meyer Takes Post as Chairman of Board.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19. (AP)—President Hoover today announced Ambassador Dawes would retire as chairman of the American Arms Delegation to become president of the reconstruction finance corporation and that Secretary Stimson would replace him at Geneva.

The President said Eugene Meyer—governor of the federal reserve board—would be chairman of the board of the proposed \$2,000,000,000 finance corporation.

Secretary Stimson's place as chairman of the delegation at the opening sessions at Geneva next month will be taken by Ambassador Hugh Gibson.

Hoover Gratified

President Hoover said these sudden changes in plans were necessitated by the fact that unless Dawes were named to and accepted the position as head of the new corporation, he would sail from the United States tomorrow.

A conference must be had between the senate and house for reconciliation of differences in details of the corporation bills, but the President is expected to have the legislation for signature in the next few days. Soon thereafter, it is hoped credit can be started flowing to business in many fields.

The President, announcing the selections at his regular Tuesday press conference, said he was gratified to state Dawes had accepted the important assignment. The former vice-president is a guest at the white house.

POLICE LEAVE TO ARREST TRAPPER

AKLAVIK, N. W. T., Jan. 19. (AP)—A crazed Bat River trapper, barricaded in his cabin-dugout 50 miles south of here was the motive which today spurred 10 Royal Canadian Mounted Police-men across the vast wilderness behind a dog team. They left here late Saturday and no word had been received from them since that time.

Albert Johnson, the trapper, has been sought since December 31, when he shot Constable A. W. King as King sought to question him over complaints by Indians that Johnson was molesting their trappines. King will recover.

Eight Mounties made an attempt on January 7 to arrest Johnson, but the crazed trapper withstood a 15-hour attack of high explosives and pistol fire. The roof of his cabin was blown away, but Johnson only took to his dugout beneath the shack and continued hurling oaths and rifle fire at his would-be captors.
