(Continued from Page One) bers to high school on visits initiated by the colleges. Faculty members may go to high schools to make commencement addresses only when invited by the high schools. A report on such a visit must be made to the state board.

High Schools Affected. The board also adopted a recommendation curtailing the practice of colleges inviting high school students to the campuses. Only those specifically named and of long standing will now be permitted.

The board agreed that the band contests and the high school track meet be held on alternate years at the university and the state colleges.

A catalog giving accurate information on the courses to be had at each school will be had up by the board. This measure was aimed at eliminating rivalry in attracting students through possible misrepresentation.

In addition to those rulings, the board:

Decided to inform the state board of control that county agents and some other educational officers could not comply with the eight-hour day, five and one-half day week limitation on state-owned automobiles.

CHECKS OF TURKEY SALES DUE SHORTLY

Klamath Turkey Growers Association members who shipped in the Christmas pool, December 10, may expect to receive their checks from the Oregon Turkey Growers association within this week, E. M. Hauser, assistant county agent, stated Tuesday.

Of the 1135 birds shipped, weighing 14,709 pounds, 85 per cent were graded prime, the highest grade, 12 per cent were choice, and only 3 per cent were rated as commercial birds, Hauser informed.

The returns on the birds is slightly higher than growers would have received if they sold to independent buyers at the time of shipment, Hauser said. The birds were sold in Eastern markets.

Prices received were: Prime young hens, 25 1/2c; prime young toms, 24 1/2c; prime old hens, 23 1/2c; choice young hens, 20c; choice young toms, prime old toms, choice old hens, 19c; choice old toms, 17c; commercial birds, 15c.
