

WHITTLESEY INDICTMENT IS QUASHED

A third indictment against R. D. Whittlesey, charged with reckless driving, was quashed by Circuit Judge W. M. Duncan, Monday, when he upheld a demurrer filed by Ralph W. Hogan, defense attorney, claiming that the indictment did not state facts constituting a crime.

District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters announced that another indictment against Whittlesey will be asked of the next grand jury. Whittlesey was the driver of an automobile which struck and fatally injured Gustav Tomov, a pedestrian, on South Sixth street last August.

A technical error in the indictment brought about its dismissal on Monday. The particular technicality which threw the indictment out of court was the use of a disjunctive, specifically the word "or" instead of a conjunctive, presumably the word "and" in describing the alleged manner in which Whittlesey was driving at the time of the accident. It was the contention of the defense that the use of the disjunctive constituted a failure to state specifically with what crime the defendant was accused.

District Attorney Gillenwaters said the indictment was drawn up according to statute. Two previous indictments against Whittlesey were held faulty by the court, on the ground that they failed to name all witnesses who appeared before the grand jury. Originally the district attorney had asked for an indictment charging manslaughter, but the grand jury which first investigated the case returned an indictment of reckless driving.

DAILEY HEARING SET BY COFER

Hearing of charges against Harry Dailey, city building inspector, was set for 2:30 p. m., January 25 at the city hall, by Mayor Fred H. Cofer at the regular council meeting Monday night. A formal protest was filed a fortnight ago by Wallace D. Stiles and B. M. Smith charging Dailey with conducting his office for his own personal benefit. They recommended his dismissal and establishment of the office of building inspector on a fee basis instead of regular salary.

Contract for auditing the city books for the year 1931 was awarded to Robinson-Nowell and company for the sum of \$930 as compared to last year's price of \$1250. The work will be done under the personal supervision of Roland Radolph and will begin this month. The same firm was given the contract last year.
