MANY LAWSUITS FILED ON TUESDAY

Suit has been filed in circuit court by C. V. Drake, doing business as the Drake Lumber and Fuel company, against E. C. Walden et al. The plaintiff asks for judgment and foreclosure of lien.

Suit has also been filed by Ruth S. Addison versus M. Marchand and N. Marchand, guardians of an insane person. The plaintiff asks for foreclosure of mortgage to pay a promissory note of \$3,200 with interest, and for \$600 attorney's fees with costs and disbursements in the case.

Klamath Machine and Locomotive company is plaintiff in a suit against the Spring Street Iron Works, and asks for \$263 alleged to be due on merchandise as well as attorney fees and costs.

The Spring Street Iron Works is also defendant in a suit brought by the Pacific R. R. Steel company. The plaintiff asks for \$118.25 alleged due on merchandise, with interest, attorney's fees and costs of the action.

Suit has also been filed by Al Varner versus George Trammel for \$300 with interest alleged due him, and \$75 attorney's fees.

Resident of Bly Dies at Tule Lake

Frank Williamson, 60-year-old resident of Bly, died suddenly of heart failure at Tule Lake Tuesday morning. Williamson was generally well known among stockmen of Klamath county and had lived here 15 years.

Williamson had been working for James Owens of Bly at Tule Lake the past three months. He was driving a hay wagon Tuesday morning when his death occurred.

He was born in Minnesota and was 60 years of age. The remains are at the A. H. Whitlock funeral home. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

March on Washington Organized by Priest

Nancy Miller, Princess of Indore, Lands in America For Short Trip to Seattle

NEW YORK, Jan. 20, (U.P.)—An American girl with a \$200,000 husband, a royal chateau in France and a palace in India, stood on the boat deck of an incoming ocean liner today and smiled happily, almost wistfully, at New York's fog-bound skyline. The former Nancy Miller of Seattle was coming home on her first visit since her marriage four years ago to the former Maharajah of Indore, Sir Tukaji Rao Holkar.

She left his highness in Egypt to mind their two babies and will

rejoin him after a two-week visit in Seattle.

The Maharajah sent along one R. Khosha, a sharp-eyed Hindu retainer, to look after the princess, and so far he has been right on the job. Once or twice at the beginning of the voyage from Naples the maharajah essayed to speak to young men passengers on the ship, but always Khosha was at her elbow beckoning her to come away.

Most of the way over, the princess ate at an inconspicuous table in one corner of the dining saloon with Khosha and Miss Christine Dulpe, a French com-

panion, also engaged by the maharajah.

Hindus In Party

One or two other Hindu men completed the party. They kept to themselves unless sent for by Khosha, always however, appearing discreetly in the background to save the princess from any unwelcome attentions.

Except for a tiny red spot on her forehead, the mark of her husband's Hindu caste, there were no outward signs of her conversion to the Indian faith. She was dressed in the smartest of Parisian travelling suits with a tight-fitting black coat topped with an astrakhan collar. A close-fitting French hat, a model from Paris, was set jauntily on the side of her head.

Her highness laughed at reports that her husband was displeased with her because she presented him only with girl babies. "It makes no difference," she said. "My husband's son by his first marriage is now on the throne of Indore. We are happy with what we have."

Alaskan Volcano Reported Active By Ship Captain

DUTCH HARBOR, Alaska, Jan. 20, (U.P.)—The Mount Cleveland volcano on Chuginadak island erupted January 1 after being inactive for years, according to word brought here today by Captain Andrew Nelson, captain of the 65-foot motorship Eunice.

Chuginadak island is one of four mountainous islands in the Aleutian group, 150 miles west of Unalaska. Captain Nelson said the volcano erupted seven times in an hour. Dense smoke poured from the crater. The sky was continuously darkened as the Eunice sailed away. For years only a little steam has seeped from the crater.

Grizzle outlined the aims of the taxpayers and the purpose behind its organization, and Morrison told of alleged laxity in local government, and the vote in operation. After these talks a general discussion was held.

The next meeting of the Klamath League of Women Voters will be held Tuesday morning, February 2, at which time affirmative and negative discussions of the moratorium will be heard.

Mrs. H. P. Bosworth, Jr., will present the affirmative arguments, and Mrs. Nelson Reed the negative.

Additional Names Drawn for Jury

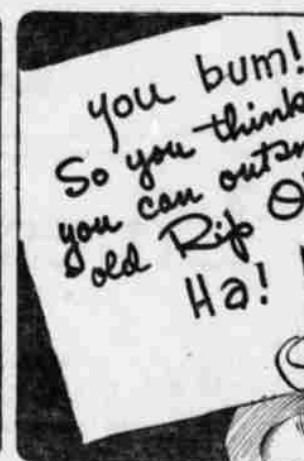

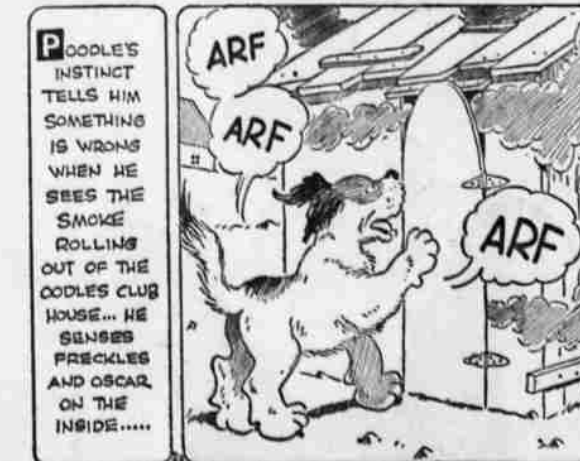
