PELICAN TEAM RECOVERS FROM MEDFORD LOSS

The possibilities of a shake-up in the Klamath lineup for the Grants Pass game here Friday night has sent the Pelican team into an eager fight to retain their first string positions. A major basketball reversal against Medford last week has prompted Dwight French, head coach, to look to his reserve lists for prospective regulars.

The rise of Howard Pernell, sharp-shooter of the squad, has lent some optimism to the Pelican hoop drive. Pernell, recovering from an injured hand, may start the Grants Pass game along with Bill Mayhew, forward, who has begun to push the high scoring Bill Ester.

The sudden slump of Ray Allen, center, may force French to make further changes in the starting lineup. Unless Allen regains his usual form, Don Kneival, guard, may be moved up into the tip-off position.

The addition of Woodrow Tripplette, veteran from last season, will strengthen the Klamath attack. Tripplette, the finest offensive player on the squad, has been out with typhoid fever, and will become eligible immediately upon the close of the semester.

Bruce Breland and Louis Molinch, crowding the first stringers, may also find positions in the starting lineup against the Cave-men.

CHICAGO, Jan. 21. (AP)—The fancy cue of Chicago's own Arthur Thurnblad is still a threat to the challengers of his three-cushion billiard title.

In a thrilling struggle last night he defeated Lee Kenney, the Northern champion, to enter a three-cushion lead in the 1932 championships.

Johnny Layton of Sedalia, Mo., ten times three-cushion king, and Frank S. Scoville of Buffalo, the Eastern champion, shared the top rung with him, claiming two victories and no defeats.

Jake Shafer of San Francisco, the world's 15-2 balkline ruler, will stage his second appearance in the tournament tonight, engaging Kenney. Otto Reisselt of Philadelphia, a former titlist, and Bud Westhus of St. Louis, Southern champion, will open the evening matches.

Thurnblad's victory last night was hard earned, and the score was 59 to 41 in 47 innings. In an earlier contest Scoville surprised even his own followers by turning back the veteran Gus Copulos of Eugene, Ore., 59 to 34 in 48 innings.

Boseman succumbed to Layton, 50 to 41, after the coast star staged a spectacular uphill battle.

Allen Hall, rated the tournament favorite at the start, stopped into the win column by defeating Westhus, 50 to 29, in 51 innings.

SPORTSMEN TO AID GAME RESOLUTIONS

The Klamath Sportsmen's association and the Klamath Isaac Walton League have endorsed a resolution made by the Tule Lake American Legion post No. 14, Tule Lake grange, and the executive committee of the Tule Lake chamber of commerce to the federal game commission relative to the Tule lake game refuge. It was learned today.

The resolution sets out by meets and bounds the land which the organizations wish included in the Tule lake game refuge (for ducks and geese), asks that the boundaries be made permanent and states that the land included amounts to about 3,000 acres. Boundaries described are about the same as they were under 1930 laws, with the exception of an east side dike which the reclamation service proposes to construct.

The boundaries asked will leave one-half mile of shooting ground on the east side of Tule lake refuge and one and one-half miles of shooting ground on the south side. The one and one-half miles on the south were shooting grounds in 1930 but in 1931 were closed by presidential decree.

The remainder of the resolution stated that a hunters' recreation ground was needed; that Tule lake people have fed the birds which come there and forage on their crops; that the sanctuary was the largest in the state and if it was made larger would be a hardship on northern California hunters; that the petitioners were in favor of contention have carried on salvaging programs for crippled birds; and that the boundaries asked were sought as the permanent refuge boundaries.
