After visiting the courthouse, the party of officials had gone to the Rivoli building, at Twelfth and Main. As they were examining the heating system, one of Sparrow's companions suggested they find the janitor, who was in another part of the basement. One of the men started to light a match, and Sparrow stepped backward into the pit. His head struck the cement.

The pit was about six feet deep, and the same distance across. It was evidently constructed for installation of some part of the heating equipment. Sparrow's head struck the bottom of the cement bin, and narrowly missed a protruding pipe, which, according to the physician, would have caused instant death.

Although Sparrow was not unconscious he was in a state of delirium when his companions removed him to the Klamath Valley hospital. His condition was unchanged at a late hour Friday afternoon.

Mrs. Sparrow and their son were immediately notified in Medford. They arrived late Thursday afternoon.

As he reached the chair, of

his own accord he began unbuttoning the top buttons of his white shirt.

As he stood there, firmly on his feet and still smiling, his face came to rest on the figure of Sergeant Stephen Lyons, one of the guards who had been attentive to him in the death house. His smile broadened and he said, cheerfully, "Hello, Sarge."
