MAIN CANAL SHOWN IN 'ERA' PICTURE

A full page picture of a section of the main canal of the Klamath project of the United States Reclamation Service occupies the front cover of the Reclamation Era, January number, of the Bureau of Reclamation.

Klamath is mentioned in two other places in the issue which states: "During several recent months a great number of cattle and sheep have been shipped or driven to the Klamath project, and it is estimated that 40,000 head of beef cattle, 7,000 of which are feeders, 70,000 lambs, and 225,000 head of ewes, are being fed on project farms and Tule Lake lease lands."

The second mention is a picture of the concrete flume on "C" canal, Klamath project.

This number includes 18,000 books circulated by county branch libraries, of which there are 13 in the county. Two book van routes are also operated by Miss Nye.

A total of 1,918 new books were added to the shelves of the county library during the year, and an average of 150 visitors per day is shown in the report.
