

GODDARD TO SPEAK AT CHURCH SUNDAY

County Judge F. R. Goddard will make the address this Sunday evening, January 24, at 1:30 o'clock, at the Methodist Episcopal church, in the special series arranged by Rev. Melville T. Wire.

Judge Goddard's topic will be "Juvenile Delinquency in Klamath County."

Judge Goddard has some surprising stories to relate concerning the cases which have come before the court. The pressure of hard times and some of the dire results of poverty, as well as conditions growing out of divided homes and parental carelessness.

Judd on October 16. Mrs. Judd at present, however, is being tried only for the murder of Mrs. Lerol.

Other Evidence Involved. In addition to the suitcase, a hatbox and two trunks were awaiting admission when argument over admissibility of the first three items into evidence while counsel and judge consulted authorities.

Attorneys Schenk and Low-kowsky argued the suitcase did not come under the rule by which the other receptacles might be entered in evidence, since it contained "only parts of the body of Miss Samuelson and nothing else."

The two trunks and the hatbox, defense indicated, would not be protested, since they were understood to have contained

portions of bodies and material pertinent to both the Lerol and Samuelson cases.

Consult Library. Judge Howard C. Speakman accepted from county attorney Lloyd J. Andrews briefs of supreme court decisions affecting the point, and defense counsel adjourned to the Klamath county law library to consult.

The bogging down of the state's hitherto rapid progress came while the first witness of the day, John D. Washington, negro head porter at the Phoenix Union station, was on the stand. Washington rolled his eyes toward Mrs. Judd seated at the counsel table, identified her as a woman whom he had helped aboard the Southern Pacific train for Los Angeles at 8 p. m. October 15.

Baggage on Train. "I put her baggage on the train," he said. "She had a suitcase and a hatbox. The hatbox had 'A M' on it." Mrs. Judd's maiden name was McKinnel.

Washington identified the suitcase when it was brought to the witness chair.

"Did you ever see that before?" Andrews asked the porter. "Yes, I put it on the 8:10 train October 15."

"Whose was it, do you know?" "That lady sitting over there."

He turned his eyes again to indicate Mrs. Judd.

Objection by defense counsel when the state attempted to have the suitcase marked as state exhibit "E" in evidence, stopped further questioning of Washington.

The ceremonies will be broadcast over a national radio hook-up, and climax a nation-wide outpouring of congratulations from the millions of readers who have come to follow "Bringing Up Father" since its first appearance two decades ago.

The anniversary brought out the fact that Jiggs and Maggie had come a long way since they started. They are not only the most widely followed couple in American newspapers, but they speak twenty-nine languages to the readers of papers in seventy-one countries. Their total number of readers each day runs close to the stupendous figure of one hundred million, by virtue of which they have become the world's greatest entertainment unit, far outstripping any attraction of the radio or movies in daily audience.

While "Bringing Up Father" is officially twenty years old, it existed in an embryonic state for a much longer time. George Mc-

Manus, as a youngster in St. Louis, had seen a vaudeville act entitled "The Rising Generation," which depicted the efforts of a newly-rich family to polish up an unwilling father for entrance into society. His humor made a deep impression on young McManus. When in the course of years he grew up to be a newspaper artist, the memory persisted with him, and in 1912, at the age of 29, he

decided to try a comic strip developing the impression that had been left with him so many years before. The rest is history.

plan to defeat the prohibition law. We have an opposition without a plan—we are just 'against' something."

The ex-governor and 1928 democratic presidential candidate said prohibition is a political question. "They even elect county clerks on it," he said. He suggested, however, that it should be taken from politics and left to the American people themselves to decide. A decision on this question, one way or another, he said, would "greatly benefit business in this country."

"Liquor is flowing freely throughout the country," he added. "If you don't know it any other way, then you'll discover it by reading the report of the Wickersham committee."

State Chairman James A. Farley, after a visit to the executive yesterday, is quoted as saying:

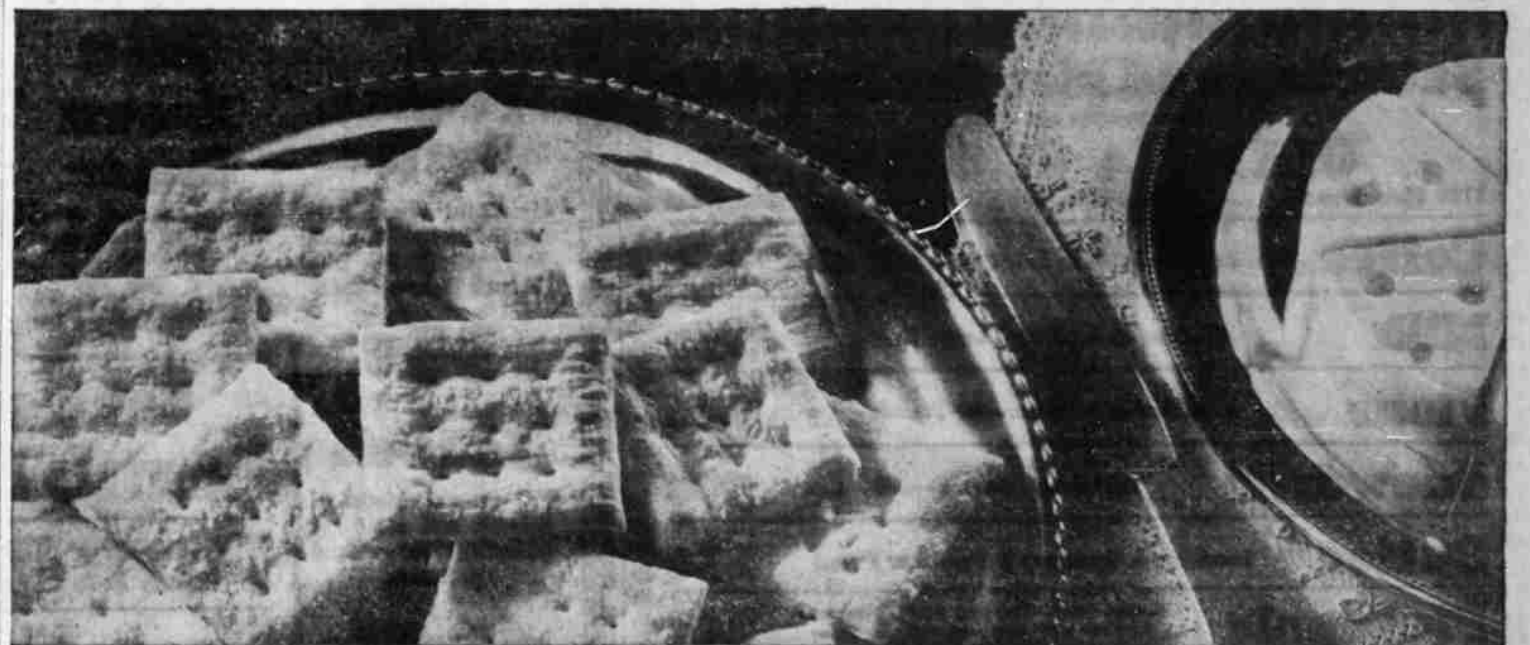
"Governor Roosevelt will be openly in the field very soon."
