

WOOL MOVEMENT IS FAIRLY GOOD

BOSTON, Jan. 22 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"There has been a fairly good movement in wool again this week, although hardly so extensive as a week ago. The call is chiefly for fine and half blood combed and woolen wools, the lower of these grades being very firm."

"The foreign markets keep along at a fairly steady pace and prices have varied but little during the week. There is a fairly good clearance reported at London at steady rates."

"In the west there has been comparatively little happening. A little business on winter loans is reported and it is figured that possibly 25,000,000 pounds of wool has been tied up on three loans thus far to date."

"The manufacturing position is promising fairly good business during the next few weeks at least."

"Fine woolled goods, whether worsted or woolen appear to have the chief call. While prices on wool are steady, wools are a bit dearer again this week."

"Mohair continues rather slow of sale and quotably without material change."

NEW YORK, Jan. 22 (AP)—The stock market experienced its sharpest setback since the January rally got under way today. Trading was moderate until the last hour, with a turnover of only about 1,500,000 shares for the day, but losses of 2 to 4 points were numerous in prominent issues.

Stocks losing 3 to 4 points included issues as U. S. Steel, American Can, Du Pont, Allied Chemical, Case, American Telephone, Eastman, Santa Fe and Norfolk and Western.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 (AP)—Grain values showed a general disposition to sag today. Reports indicating a decided surplus of domestic wheat stocks owned by flour mills as compared with flour sales and futures sold had a distinctly bearish influence. The reports, it was asserted by some trade authorities, showed plainly that millers would be purchasing little or nothing in the line of grain for months to come.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4-1/2 under yesterday's finish, corn 1/4-1/2 down, oats unchanged to 1/4 off, and provisions unchanged to 7 cents higher.
