CAUTION NEEDED ON OREGON'S ROADS CITED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23, (UP)—Although the recent cold and storm weather conditions resulted in no serious impairment to travel on state highways, wise motorists will take precautions before negotiating some sections.

In 14 of the 33 arteries that comprise the 4,000 odd miles of the state system, the state highway commission advises that snow or other conditions have made travel somewhat hazardous or impossible.

Motorists are urged to carry chains on the Pacific highway for use on the Skiyuu summit south of Ashland. Chains are advised between Emigrant Hill and Huntington for the old Oregon trail.

Oregon coast highway, formerly Roosevelt coast road, is closed to travel on the Lincoln-Lane county line—Berry creek section, and between Florence and Tulelake. The Newport-Waldport span is under construction but open for travel. Rogue river bridge at Gold Beach is now open.

On the Siuslaw highway, choice of the north fork road is suggested for the Mapleton-Florence stretch.

The Mt. Hood route is closed by snow between the junction with the Wapinitia highway and Parkdale. From Wapinitia cut-off to Maupin chains are advised. Snow has fallen on the mountain sections of the Dalles-California highway, necessitating chains. Chains are also needed on the Green Springs highway at the summit.

Local inquiry is advised at Burns or Vale before attempting the Drewry route during the winter months on the Central Oregon highway. The same counsel is given motorists who intend to attempt the trip between Ukiah and Long Creek on the Pendleton-John Day route.

Chains are advised for the Mitchell-Davies section of the Ochoco highway. The road through Crater Lake National park is closed by snow. McKenzie highway is closed by snow between Belknap springs and Sisters.

Local inquiry regarding the Entomprize-Florence highway, leading to Lewiston, Idaho is advised. The Black Canyon-Oakridge section of the Willamette highway is "rough but passable."

What are we to do with the remaining 43,000,000 acres? Wouldn't it be a fine stroke of business if we could make them productive of large additional revenue through capitalization of our wild life resources?

HERE is something along that line:

Under present conditions, a steelhead at the mouth of the Rogue is worth to the commercial fisherman about fifty cents. Each steelhead caught by sportsmen in the Rogue is worth, in the way of total expenditures by sportsmen, from \$10 to \$20.

OREGON'S wild life is a tremendously valuable resource. For us of Oregon, it makes life better worth living. This is true, whether we ever shoot a deer or catch a fish.

Doesn't it give you a worthwhile thrill to see a deer, or several deer, as you are driving along an Oregon road? Or to see a beautiful Chinese pheasant strut along, the sun gleaming on his brilliant plumage?

WE can maintain this great resource unimpaired. We can do more than that. We can INCREASE it from year to year.

All we need, to accomplish this, is good sportsmanship on the part of the majority of our people.
