

LETTER SENT HANLEY TELLS BOND SUPPORT

The citizens' executive committee on relief has sent a letter to William Hanley, Eastern Oregon member of the state highway commission, voicing vigorous support of the proposed \$1,000,000 bond issue for highway unemployment relief.

The letter, made public by J. A. Gordon, head of the committee, follows:

"Klamath county unites in petitioning you as a member of the state highway commission to act favorably on the proposed issue of \$1,000,000 additional bonds to provide funds for continuation of the present state road program.

"Unquestionably in times of stress, the duty of supporting those unable to care for themselves devolves upon the public. Recognizing that duty, and further recognizing the unfairness of any policy which attempts to meet this public need through contributions levied upon a select list of citizens, it seems obvious that taxation is proper to provide the necessary funds. City and county governments throughout this state have been lavish in expenditures providing funds for relief. Public and private donations have been generous, but unfortunately the total of such contributions is too small to carry on the work in its entirety.

"The state highway work has been a most valuable aid in providing work for a large number of people. It is our understanding that funds for the continuation of this program will be expended by March 1, and that the work will cease unless additional appropriations are made. The experience of our county indicates that conditions of unemployment are steadily growing worse, and there is little hope of improvement until well into the spring. It is within the scope of possibility that there may be more men out of work on March 1 than there are at the present time, and we believe it a matter of imperative necessity that additional funds be made available by your commission.

"This letter comes from the executive committee appointed at a general meeting of Klamath county citizens, and expresses the will of the entire body. Organizations represented were: The Taxpayers' league, Parent-Teachers association, Library club, League of Women Voters, Chamber of Commerce, Salvation Army, Governor's Relief committee, city officials, county officials, banks, timber interests, service clubs, schools, outside communities, public service corporations, as well as many individuals representing lines of business and professions.

"May we hope this request will receive your careful attention and earnest consideration?

HYDE PLEADS FOR PROFITS IN FARMING

DES MOINES, Jan. 23, (AP)—American agriculture was pictured yesterday by Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde as "the two bare hands of the individual farmer" battling in a competitive arena "where labor and finance and industry enter the mass power of their respective organizations."

His message was read before the Iowa Farm Bureau federation by Charles E. Hearst, president. Hyde pleaded for closer cooperation, more attention to the financial problems the farmers must face, more stress on profits instead of volume in production and abandonment of attempted profitable production of poor lands.

"Six million farmers are now engaged in destructive competition with each other," Hyde declared. "Each is engaged by his surplus production in beating down the price of the commodity for all."

In other lines of business, he continued, organization has replaced individualism in a cooperative attempt to regulate production, consumption and profits.

"Organization is the touchstone of farm prosperity," he said. "By organizing the farmer can unite and stop the ruthless competition of every farmer with every other, collectively plan production to meet market demand, control the surplus by preventing it, collectively stabilize prices and mobilize in the economic arena the economic power of six million American farmers."

The federal farm board, he said, seeks to bring about this co-operative enterprise, to develop it to a point where it will carry on by its own merits without outside aid.

"Wild Irishmen" Lead Revolt

MOTION MADE TO WITHDRAW PLEA

Motion to withdraw a "not guilty" plea and to file a demurrer against the indictment in the case of the state versus George Wolf, alleged hold-up man, on two grounds was filed in circuit court Friday.

The motion claims that the indictment charges two distinct crimes, that of assault armed with a dangerous weapon and that of larceny in connection with theft of funds from the bank of Bonanza.

Wolf's trial is scheduled to open in circuit court Monday. The court appointed John Irwin counsel for the defense in place of Ralph Horan, who withdrew from the case.

Book Report For Month Shows 150 Visitors a Day

The annual report of the Klamath county library shows that 77,955 books were circulated during 1931, according to Miss Margaret Nye, librarian.

This number includes 16,000 books circulated by county branch libraries, of which there are 15 in the county. Two book van routes are also operated by Miss Nye.

A total of 1,918 new books were added to the shelves of the county library during the year, and an average of 150 visitors per day is shown in the report.

ACTION AGAINST LONG DISMISSED

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 23, (UP) Huey P. Long's right to the governorship of Louisiana was upheld by the state supreme court today when an ouster suit brought by Dr. Paul N. Cyr, the former lieutenant governor, was dismissed.

The seven judges decided, by a 4 to 3 vote, that there was "no cause for action against the governor."

Long, who is also U. S. senator-elect from Louisiana, left the city before the judges had time to announce their decision. It was reported he would proceed soon to Washington to appear before a senate sub-committee which is questioning Long's right to leave his senate seat vacant and continue to hold office as governor.
