Great Spanish Pianist to Appear Here in Concert

Jose Iturbi, the great Spanish pianist, who plays here on the evening of January thirtieth, at the auditorium of Klamath Union high school, was pleased at the idea of returning to this country for another tour this year. He said he had no idea before coming here, how homelike America could be. As a matter of fact, he was invited to give concerts here seven years ago, but didn't because he was afraid it wouldn't turn out well.

Last season, even though he was a sensational success each time he appeared, he worried over each recital as much as if it were his debut. Usually, on an evening when he was to play, he ate nothing but a raw apple for dinner and paced the floor an hour or two. Between concerts, he went to Harlem to listen to jazz, to a gymnasium to box with the instructor, and motoring.

He owns two cars and likes to drive fast. On his European concert tours he often travels by motor, and often beats train time. Boxing and motoring, he has little of the average pianist's extreme concern for the safety of his hands, but he nevertheless takes his music very seriously, so seriously that he doesn't like to talk about it, and hates people who try to draw him out.

He was born in Valencia and is now thirty-five. He had his first piano lesson at the age of three, studied later in Barcelona and at the Paris Conservatory but his art is to a large extent self-taught. One day he was playing at the Hotel Bauer-au-Lac in Zurich. The telephone rang. It was the director of the Conservatory of Geneva who offered him a position as head of the piano faculty, a post once held by Liszt. He stayed four years there and then embarked on his own career. He was a success from the start.

He is giving it out all the time, it is the one thing he demands in return—of life and music and people.

He says he wept when he saw the New York skyline for the first time. Its beauty moved him as powerfully as his first view of Venice from the sea. It is easy to believe him, for it is genuine appreciation and none of the eye-to-the-gallery stuff. His first night in New York was spent in Harlem, listening to negro music, the second at a musical comedy, hearing Broadway jazz. The pianist who has all the subtleties of his own native idiom at his finger-tips adores plain jazz.

"It is spontaneous. It is important because it has influenced so many composers of serious music. Some use it successfully. Others don't. And with them it becomes an affection."
