

SEXTON SAYS 4-H ACTIVITY ON INCREASE

Increased activity in Klamath county 4-H club work is reported by County Agent Frank Sexton who has organized a number of boys and girls clubs throughout the county in the last few days.

Sexton expects the Merrill Baby Beef club to be one of the outstanding in the county. It was formed January 19 at the home of William Bailey who will be a local leader. Bailey has had a great deal of experience in club work and one of his herd of beef cattle won a prize when shown at the Klamath county fair last fall and later was sold as fancy baby beef for a premium price.

The members of the club have each had from six to seven years experience in club work. Six Aberdeen Angus calves about five months old have been purchased by the club members from D. E. Alexander of Rock Creek ranch. They will be grown until next fall under 4-H rules and fed on balanced rations for show purposes at the fair next fall and then sold as fancy baby beef.

Members of the club are Lawrence and Donald Frasier, James Stevenson, Richard Anderson, Marshall Arnold, Robert Gillespie, and Richard Pittman. All reside near Merrill and in the Tule Lake section.

Two clubs in cookery under the leadership of Bernice Phelps and Ella Wood have been formed at Bonanza and a camp cookery class will be formed soon.

A girls sewing club was organized at Malin on January 22 with Florence Sanders, an experienced 4-H worker, as leader and with the following members: Dolores Taut, Lura Osborne, Vivian Martin, Margaret Victorine, Aletha Link, Viola Pittman, Maxine Haier and Vivian Moody.

Girls clubs in cooking have also been organized at Malin.

February 6 the county 4-H club council will meet at the Fremont school in Klamath Falls with County Agent Sexton, when local leaders, teachers and parents will attend to discuss the program and problems of 4-H clubs.

HAWAII PREPARES DRIVE ON CRIMES

HONOLULU, Jan. 25.—Hawaii looked to its newly created police commission today for a concerted drive on criminal elements blamed for an outbreak of lawlessness unparalleled in the history of the islands.

Placed in control of law enforcement here by a hurriedly adopted act of the island legislature, now in special session, the commission was faced immediately with demands for the capture of a desperate young criminal who recently escaped from Oahu prison.

Peace officers were stirred to new activity in the war against "lynch law" justice and terrorism, but citizens were puzzled by the failure of Hawaii's grand jury to act on four indictments in the "honor slaying" of Joe Kahahawai, one of five islanders recently tried on charges of attacking a young navy officer's wife. His murder climaxed a long series of similar crimes coupled with riots and shootings. The grand jury has met three times and deferred action on the indictments, setting Tuesday for the next session.

SHANGHAI, China, Jan. 25. (AP)—Sun Fo, president of the executive Yuan, which is a post corresponding to that of premier of China, resigned today because the government declined to accept his policy of vigorous action against Japan.

The post of president of the executive Yuan in the government is the equivalent of the premiership. Eugene Chen, foreign minister in the cabinet, resigned earlier today for similar reasons.

GENEVA, Jan. 25. (AP)—This evening Dr. W. V. Yen, Chinese ambassador to the United States and his country's representative in the league, appeared before the council in special session to demand immediate action, to end what he called Japanese military aggression on Chinese soil.

At his elbow sat Robert Olds, his American legal adviser. Prentiss Gilbert, the American consul at Geneva, was among the spectators. There was no official representative of the United States at the council table. "Japan is now invading the province of Jehol, and endangering the cities of north, central and even south China, as witness the latest threats to occupy Foochow and Shanghai," said Dr. Yen. "These points are far away from the borders of what has hitherto been known as Manchuria."

NATIVE OREGONIAN DIES ON SUNDAY

Fannie Jane Beck, a resident of 2209 Union Ave., and of this city for over four years died Sunday. The death followed a short illness.

PRISON QUIET AFTER BLOODY SUNDAY FIGHT

DARMOOR, Eug., Jan. 25. (AP)—Dartmoor prison was quiet again today after a riot in which two men were believed to have been killed and 80 were hurt. The yards were empty of convicts, a double guard was on duty and 20 of the injured men were still in the hospital, but only one of them was in serious condition.

The battle raged all day yesterday and only the timely arrival of 100 extra police put an end to the fighting and prevented a wholesale delivery. It began with lack of sugar in the breakfast porridge. The prisoners claimed mistreatment which, they said, reached "its climax when their cereal was furnished them unswartened. Long before dawn yesterday the prison was in a hubbub with the prisoners beating on the doors of their cells and walls in protest.

Guards released them into the courtyard for exercise before chapel services and the fight began. Led by one prisoner blowing a bugle, they attacked the guards in groups and had very nearly killed them. Their freedom when police reinforcements arrived from Plymouth and turned the tide of battle.

In the meantime they had set fire to the principal prison buildings and one group, breaking into the office of the governor, R. N. Roberts, forced him to flee for his life. He escaped through a rear door, locking it as he went, and took refuge in a cell block occupied by prisoners who had not joined the riot. The prisoners then burned the administrative records, carrying them out and throwing them into a pile.

As soon as the police arrived they drew their clubs and charged, while the guards kept up a sniping fire along the walls, bringing down every man who reached the top in his attempt to escape.

Fire engines came from Plymouth to put out the blaze and they continued pouring water on the smoldering ruins through the night, long after the blaze was extinguished, to prevent its revival from slumbering sparks.

VISITS OF CURIOUS JUDD DEFENSE POINT

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Lucey of the Phoenix police investigated the house October 20. Lucey was allowed to testify over defense objections to his finding in the Judd house of a .25 calibre automatic pistol shell.

Spencer Moxey, ballistics expert of the Los Angeles police department, was recalled to identify the shell as having been fired and ejected from, in his opinion, a pistol found in Mrs. Judd's baggage.

The hiatus which threatened to disrupt the state's orderly chain of evidence was raised by Schenck and Lewkowitz when McCord Harrison, Phoenix police detective took the stand to tell of his observations at 2929 N. Second street.

He found, he said, "two distinct tracks, about 21 inches apart, leading from the southeast corner of the garage, out of the garage, through the back yard into the service porch, through the kitchen and a small hallway, into the front room."

Testimony halted. The state was attempting to establish that the large trunk, in which Mrs. Leroy's body was found, had been dragged by the slayer from the garage into the house.

Harrison's testimony was stopped by defense objections on grounds the state had not shown the premises in the same condition when Harrison visited them the night of October 19, as they had been immediately following the slayings of October 14.

"If this is going in at all," declared Lewkowitz, "I want to enter into the record also some newspaper articles."

"Newspaper articles" queried the court.

"Yes—about the public going through the place at 10 cents a throw—and I have some photographs."

Court was recessed while the judge and opposing attorneys attempted to reach an accord.

It tentatively was agreed to call other police witnesses in an effort to establish what occurred before Harrison reached the scene.

Piece Cut From Rug. Harrison testified over renewed defense objection, that he

found in the bedroom a piece cut from the rug and blood spots on the floor and baseboard in the same section of the room. He searched for the missing piece of rug, but could not find it.

One bed, Harrison said, had a thin pad on it in lieu of a mattress. On the other bed there

was no pad nor mattress—only quilts and sheets.

Lewkowitz's cross-examination disclosed Harrison had found no blood spots on the wall higher than the head of the bed, no blood under the bed or on any of the bed springs.

Dr. Harry Goss of Phoenix, as

a state expert, said he examined blood spots in the house at 2929 N. Second street on November 19, 27 days after the slayings.
