COFER RELENTS, PRESS ATTENDS COUNCIL MEET

Mayor Fred H. Cofer relented Saturday afternoon and allowed a member of the press to sit in at the special meeting of the finance committee of the city council attended by all members of the council.

The council and mayor agreed that the mayor will submit to the council Monday night a recommendation that all city employees, except the chief of the police department, have their salaries reduced from 10 per cent to 25 per cent.

They further agreed that the city will close the fire station in the city hall and move all equipment and men to the new fire station, known as fire station No. 2, or the Central fire station.

Re-opening Considered
Councilman A. B. Moore insisted that the matter of future sub-stations be kept in mind at this time and that the fire station in the city hall be reopened and others built when the financial condition of the taxpayers will allow it.

Councilman J. D. Hagley brought up the matter of the California Oregon Power company franchise and contract with the city as a possible source of revenue and it was brought out that the city attorney is now making an exhaustive survey and study of the situation and will report soon.

Measures Temporary
In making the recommendations for wage reductions and a cut in the personnel of the police department and the clerical help in the police judge's office, the council and mayor expressed the attitude that they disliked to make the reductions, which they feel are temporary emergency measures, and will do so only to make the expenses of the city come within the present income.

The council expect to save \$1200 monthly by the reductions which will be made. If the council adopts the recommendations on Monday night.

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GRAINS RALLY FROM DOWNTURN

CHICAGO, Jan. 25. (AP)—Late rallies from price downturn in grains today appeared to result mainly from pit conditions instead of new developments.

There were some wheat crop complaints, however, because of alternate freezing and thawing east of the Mississippi river. Notice was taken, too, of 1,949,000 bushels decrease of the United States wheat visible supply, and of trade predictions that Spain would increase her wheat imports in the spring.

Wheat closed unsettled 1/4¢ to 1/2¢ above Saturday's finish. Corn 1/4¢ to 1/2¢ up, oats unchanged to 1/2¢ higher, and provisions unchanged to 1/2¢ lower.
