POLICE BASE CLUE ON RANSOM LETTER

DENVER, Col., Jan. 23. (UP)—On a note scrawled by extortionists who held Benjamin P. Bower for \$50,000 ransom police tonight based their hopes of rescuing the wealthy bakery official.

Its contents closely guarded, the note was delivered to the home of Stephen Knight, head of the bakery of which Bower is part owner.

It was reported to contain instructions through which Knight could get in touch with the kidnapers to deliver the king's ransom.

A second note purporting to be from Bower himself and asking his wife, "For God's sake, Mary, send the \$50,000," was branded today as the work of another gang of terrorists trying to "muscle in" on the case to collect the ransom.

Unemployed Kills Self Rather Than Capture by Police

NEW YORK, Jan. 25 (UP)—A holdup man, cornered by police tonight, shot himself through the temple. He died enroute to a hospital.

The body was identified as that of Richard M. Groelitz, 27. Police learned he had been without employment for 18 months and was the sole support of his mother and a sister.

"He was just desperate," Mrs. Louis E. Groelitz, his mother, said. Groelitz held up two clerks in a hat store, obtained \$150. They followed him out, screaming for police. Traffic policemen fell in behind the fleeing bandit and cornered him in the flower shop of a department store where Groelitz killed himself rather than submit to arrest.

Fort Klamath Has Heavy Snow Storm

FORT KLAMATH, Ore. (Special)—Fort Klamath was visited Friday night and all day Saturday by the second blizzard-like storm of the winter, accompanied by high winds and a heavy fall of snow, which was blown into high drifts by the strong wind. Saturday night the storm abated, the weather moderating and a warm Chinook wind melting the snow rapidly and causing considerable slush in the roads. Old-timers in this vicinity state that this is the most snow seen here since 1910. The local highway crew has been busy with the snowplow and scraper, cleaning the roads in this district and has succeeded in keeping the highways in excellent condition for motorists.

Sun Mountain Snow Reaches 22 Feet

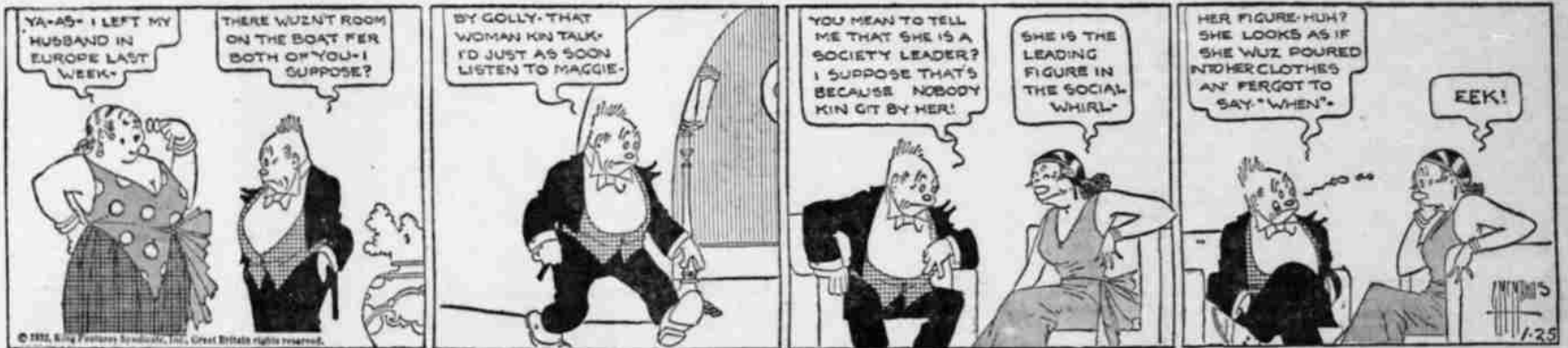

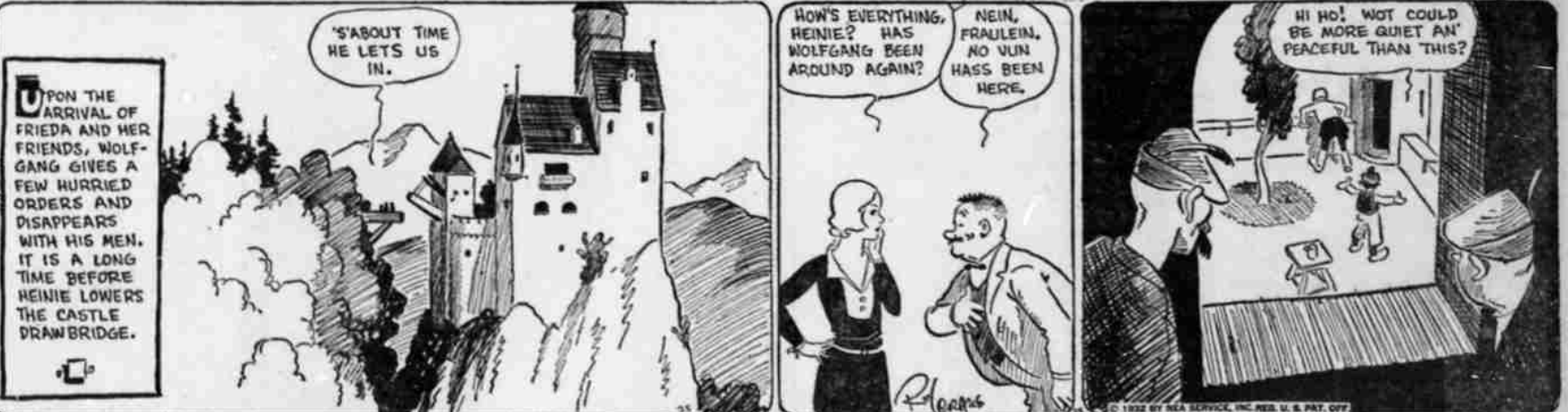
