

RELIEF PLAN FOR LANGELL AREA FAVORED

Secretary F. E. Thompson and Directors Frank Grohs, H. J. Tichnor and Walter Campbell of the Langell valley irrigation district met Saturday afternoon with B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath project, U. S. R. S. and received his approval on a proposed two-year moratorium of construction charges in order to place the district on a more substantial financial basis.

In order to do this, directors asked Hayden for his approval of a district levy of \$1.50 per acre for the coming year. Levies of from \$1.10 to \$2.10 were considered by the board which finally placed the figure at \$1.50, realizing that any lower levy would not enable them to meet expenses.

Hayden approved the plan, which has been under consideration since last summer, and from correspondence received from the reclamation commissioner at Washington, D. C., indications are that it will be passed. The Langell valley directors will ask for a supplementary contract to permit them to let the construction charges ride for a two-year period.

The district has 40 years to pay off indebtedness, but because of adverse conditions it has had difficulty in collecting charges. For that reason they have proposed the moratorium plan on construction charges to permit them to place the district on a cash basis. If expenditures are carefully watched, they explained, they will be able to do this in two years, if a \$1.50 levy is approved.

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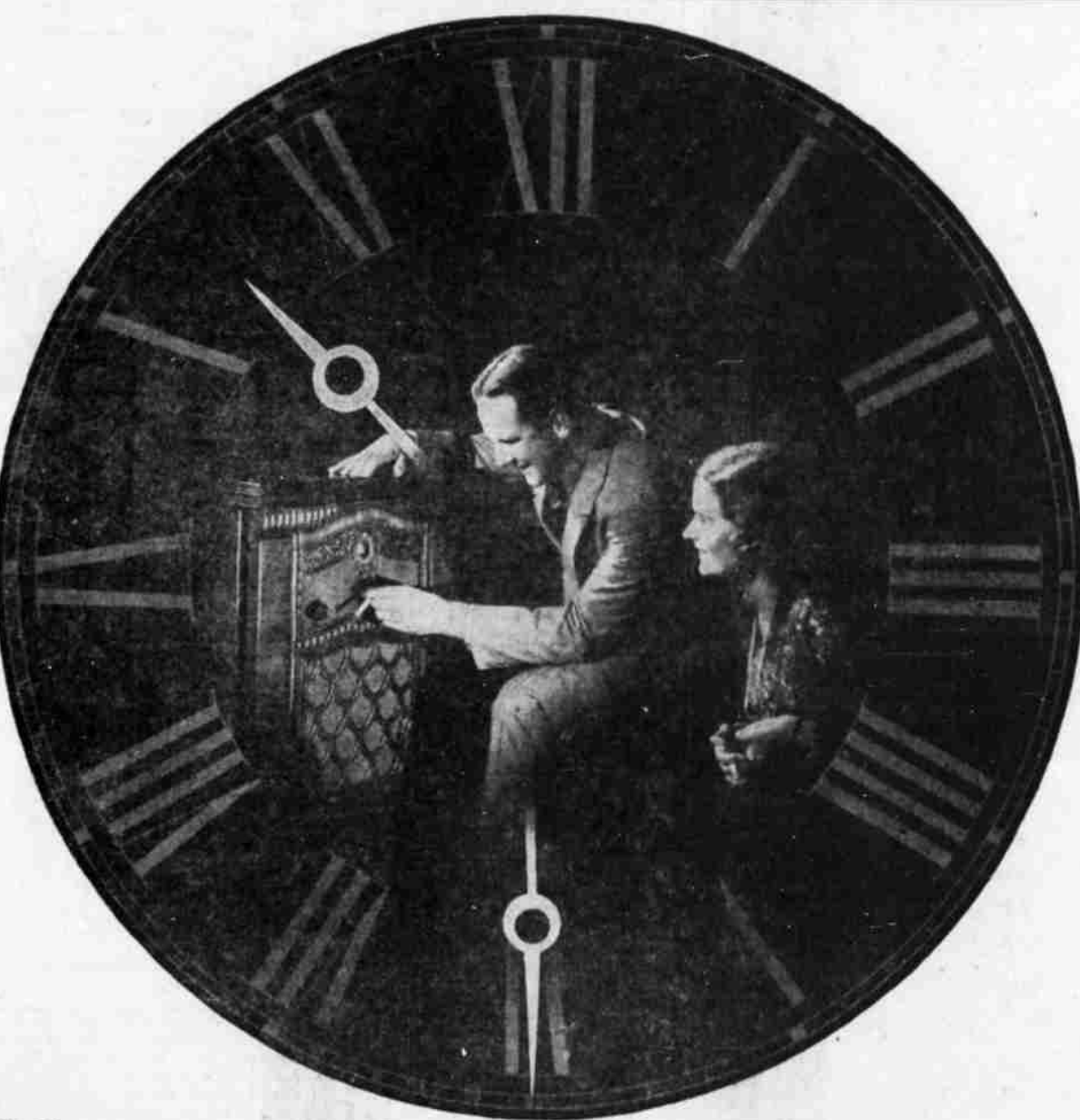
