

Nationalista Signed for Next Card

Famous Filipino fighter Will meet Doc Snell in Main Event; Becker and Jackson are Placed Against Stiff Opposition.

The success-seeking youngster, Young Doc Snell, Portland, Ore., is a good as on his way back to Klamath Falls for a main event which at one of the most victory-punching Filipinos ever to sail eastward across the Pacific.

Young Nationalista—now not so young, perhaps, but still beating his way to ring triumphs through the solidity of right and left blows and through the cleverness of a mind sharpened to all the intricacies of the ring in a long career of top-notch boxing.

And along with this leading six rounds of speed and punches, Herb Owen, matchmaker, has announced the following fights for the Legion hall program:

Pete Becker, Klamath Falls, vs. Red Stanley, Portland, six rounds.
Johnny Jackson, Chiloquits, vs. Bud McCloud, Vancouver, Wash., six rounds.
"Huzz Saw" Zimmerman, Klamath Falls, vs. Russell Howard, Klamath Falls, four rounds.
Young Schmeling, Klamath Falls, vs. Orlando Farmer, Eugene, four rounds.

A four-round curtain raiser still to be named.

Several years ago Nationalista entered into a series of 16-round main events in Portland against the ranking bantam of Multnomah club who had just turned to a professional career.

Young Nationalista, rapidly going to the peak of coast boxing, raced his way to a decision in the first and then was held to a draw in the second.

The two fights were such brilliant duels of the brain and fists, a third was promoted—that third was the end to Tommy O'Brien. The Filipino stopped every ambition O'Brien fostered for a professional record—stopped him physically, too, for O'Brien quit the game shortly after.

O'Brien wasn't just the ordinary simon-pure inducted into the money fighting to swell gate receipts with local popularity. The Multnomah club man had in him the possibilities of one of the outstanding fighters of the country. He was managed by Tom Louitt, Portland, former boxing instructor at the club, and now one of the most prominent football officials in the Pacific coast conference.

Two things—Young Nationalista and a too quick step into main event fighting—ended O'Brien long before he entered the so-called sacred circle of class boxing.

While O'Brien was punched out of the game, Nationalista went on, and still is among the best attractions in the "little man" division.

Pete Becker, rival to all Steamboat Jackson, cherishes in Klamath Falls, goes against an unknown for six rounds when he meets Red Stanley. The red-head will have to be a better man than Chief Thomas, for this time Becker can win fights with one hand—well, two hands won't hurt his chances Monday.

Becker never heard of Stanley until Monday, when Owen sent along word of the fight. "Don't care who he is," Becker said. "I've fought good ones and had ones without ever seeing them before or after the fight. If Owen says this man is a great fighter, he will be, but I'll be ready."

Gorilla Jones Wins Middleweight Title

ITALIAN OUT IN SIXTH AS BOUT HALTED

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 25. (AP)—Wm. "Gorilla" Jones, long-armed 26-year-old negro of Memphis, Tenn., was recognized today by the National Boxing association as middleweight champion of the world.

Jones won the title last night by defeating Odonne Piazza, sturdy youth of Milan, Italy, on a technical knockout in the sixth round of a 10-round battle, fought before a disappointing crowd of 5,500.

Succeeds Walker
It was the championship bout of an elimination tournament conducted under the auspices of the N. B. A. to determine a successor to Mickey Walker. He gave up the throne a year ago because he could no longer make the weight limit of 160 pounds.

The Memphis negro, backed with five years of campaigning, out-classed, out-boxed, and out-fought the 22-year-old Italian aspirant. After a slow start, he battered Piazza to pulp and had him on the verge of collapse when the bout was ended by the referee.

Jones won every round, with the exception of the first. Jones scaled 152 1/2 pounds and Piazza 153 1/2.

CARNERO TRIUMPHS IN PARIS BATTLE

Boston Heavy is Favored To Triumph in Tournament

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. (UP)—Ernie Schaaf of Boston is the favorite to pound his way through a series of heavyweight elimination bouts at Madison Square Garden during the next six weeks, and thus to become alternate for Jack Sharkey in the Max Schmeling title bout here in June.

James J. Johnston, manager of boxing at the garden, announced tonight that the winner of the bouts would receive Sharkey against Schmeling in case anything happened to Sharkey at the last minute.

Matches Drawn
The three elimination bouts are scheduled as follows:
January 29—King Levinsky of Chicago vs. Max Baer of San Francisco, 10 rounds.
February 5—Ernie Schaaf of Boston vs. Paolino Ucedano of Spain, 10 rounds.
February 26 or March 4—Winners of first two bouts meet in 15-round bout.

Levin's by a 5 to 5 favorite to defeat Baer, and Schaaf is an 8 to 5 favorite to win over Ucedano. If Levin and Schaaf meet in the 15-round final, Schaaf probably will be installed as the 5 favorite over the Chicago fish merchant.

Both Baer and Levin are harder hitters than Schaaf, and the veteran Paolino is the most rugged of the four. But Schaaf is the better boxer, having assimilated most of the tricks of the trade from his stable-mate Jack Sharkey.

Baer, the 23-year-old Californian with the mah-killing punch, may defeat Levin if he connects squarely with the button; but this will be a new experience for Levin. Boxing experts believe Levin's wild, continuous attack will wear the Californian down. Baer lost to Paolino in a 20-round bout at Reno, July 4, but he has improved much since then.

Baer Training
Although Paolino, 21-year-old iron man of the ring, is rugged and a hard man to hit squarely because of his "shell" type of defense, the experts believe the clever Schaaf will have little difficulty in winning a decision over him.

Baer, whose right cross in the jaw killed Frankie Campbell in San Francisco about two years ago, is training hard for his affair with Levin, and many of his supporters believe he will prove an upset in the eliminations.

BASEBALL IS LARGE LOSER FROM DEATH

CHICAGO, Jan. 25. (AP)—Baseball lost not only one of its greatest leaders, but one of its greatest spenders in the death of William Wrigley, Jr., at Phoenix, Ariz., today.

Taking up the national pastime as a hobby, Wrigley spent millions to give Chicago a pennant winning team, and always insisted he never realized one cent from his interests in the club, one of the best money earners in all baseball history.

Expensive Hobby
"I bought the Cubs not only because I love baseball, but because I once was joshed about a large city like Chicago having such poor ball clubs," he once said, in telling of his interest in the game.

"When I was on the road selling soap years ago, the other salesmen used to kid me about Chicago's weak clubs, and I resolved to buy the Cubs."

"Altogether I think I have spent \$4,000,000 or more in building up my team, but I never have taken a nickel of the profits. It is purely a hobby for me, and as long as I can afford such an expensive hobby and give the fans a thrill, why, I'm happy. I'd rather watch a good ball game than to attend a stockholders' meeting and listen to bumper reports, and I guess I play hooker regularly to go out to Wrigley field."

Shock to Baseball
Wrigley's death, which came as a distinct shock to baseball and to Chicago's civic leaders, who regarded him as one of the staunchest pillars in this city's civic life, removed from baseball Chicago's second major league club owner in three months. On October 26, 1931, Charles A. Comiskey, "baseball's Old Roman," and owner of the White Sox, died at his country home in Erie, Pa.

Comiskey, son of the "Old Roman," and heir of the White Sox club, was the first to offer condolences to the bereaved Wrigley family.
