TAX AUTHORITIES HERE FOR SURVEY

J. E. Bonnell and E. G. Woodford of the state tax commission's office arrived Monday from Salem to conduct a revaluation and property equalization survey of Klamath Falls and Klamath county. Bonnell and Woodford came here at the request of the county granges, Taxpayers Protective League of Klamath county, and County Assessor W. T. Lee.

They will reappraise all business buildings and reclassify all property. The men will remain here indefinitely and will establish offices in the Klamath county court house.

Work on city valuation will start at once and the county work will follow. The Klamath county court budget committee recently appropriated \$3500 to cover the cost of the work.

Relief Supply Of Wood is Exhausted
