

RATE CHANGES ON LIVESTOCK ARE ANNOUNCED

Effective January 25 on all western railroads the rates on livestock were changed by an order which was published by the direct instructions of the Interstate Commerce commission. California intra-state shipments are not included in the order although railroad officials expect a similar order effecting such shipments from the California Railroad commission.

The I. C. C. rates are to equalize rates between points on all western lines. Rates were formerly based on a per car charge but they have been changed to a per hundred-weight basis.

For example the former rate on cattle per car from Klamath Falls to San Francisco was \$114 per car; now the rate is 42 cents per hundred pounds with a minimum of \$4.00 pounds or a minimum of \$100.00. Average cars of cattle weigh 27,000 to 30,000 pounds which will bring about a slight rate increase.

Sheep formerly cost \$125 a car from Klamath to San Francisco. Now the rate is 42 cents a hundred with a minimum of 20,000 pounds or \$4 a car minimum. The average weight per car is less than the 20,000 pounds which will allow sheep shippers a saving in marketing.

In general the new rates will result in a decrease in the rate on sheep and an increase in the rate on cattle. Feeder stock rates are on a similar basis under the new order which will result in a decrease in the freight on sheep and cattle will remain about the same.

The rates have been protested by the western railroads for a number of years and were only published by direct order of the Interstate Commerce commission. It is stated.

MEIER TO PROMOTE COLUMBIA PROJECT

PORTLAND, Jan. 27, (UP)—Governor Julius L. Meier left last night for Washington, D. C. "in accordance," he said, "with my pledge to the people of the state of Oregon."

He will appear before the board of army engineers February 1 to argue the cause of hydro-electric development of the Columbia river.

He was accompanied by Mrs. Meier, state Budget Director Henry M. Hansen and Colonel A. E. Clark.

Governor Meier contended, in a statement issued before departure, that the state's prosperity can be assured only by development of cheap power.

Aircraft Official Takes Stinson Body

CHICAGO, Jan. 27, (UP)—William A. Mara, vice president of the Stinson Aircraft corporation, arrived here today to take the body of his chief, Eddie Stinson, to Dearborn hills, near Detroit, for burial.

An inquest into Stinson's tragic death, which occurred early today after his plane had crashed into a flag pole on a public park golf course, was postponed, meanwhile, to determine whether his ship was fueled properly before it left the municipal airport.

Flagship Sets Sail For Hawaii Waters

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Jan. 27, (UP)—Carrying high navy, and army officials who will observe the annual maneuvers of the United States fleet, the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, flagship, sailed for Hawaiian waters late today.

The bulk of the battle fleet will move away from here next Monday.
