LABOR COMPLETES ANSWER TO ROADS

CHICAGO, Jan. 27 (AP)—Labor put the finishing touches tonight on its final answer to demands of American railroads that salaries be reduced 15 per cent for one year.

David B. Robertson, spokesman for the railway unions, announced that most of the 21 union groups had agreed upon their stand toward the wage reduction proposal, that others would make their decision tonight and that all would gather for a final meeting tomorrow morning.

If everything goes well, he continued, the unions will present their stand tomorrow afternoon to nine railroad presidents who have been standing by since they made their last wage reduction proposition a week ago Sunday.

Pilot's Vision Saves Indians

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28. (AP) An airmail pilot's keen vision served to relieve the hunger of a group of Indians near the northern Arizona-New Mexico boundary late today.

Soaring westward on his regular mail run, Johnny Graves, piloting a Transcontinental Western Air Express plane, noticed some figures on the snow-covered ground, waving blankets. He circled low and distinguished Indians, gesticulating and rubbing their stomachs, and then informed officers.

HOSPITAL FEES TO BE INVESTIGATED

The Central Labor council of Klamath Falls voted at its meeting Wednesday night to conduct an investigation of the relations existing between the state industrial accident commission and local hospitals. Differences rose over the amount paid by the commission for the care of injured workmen coming under its protection.

Under the rule of the commission the hospitals will be compensated \$2.75 a day for the care of injured workers. The hospitals declared, however, this was insufficient, and have set from \$4.50 to \$5.00 as the minimum.

The labor council will investigate the conditions in various cities of the state.

A letter will be sent to the commission informing it of the inquiry, and inviting a member of the group to be present here for a conference if the council is persuaded the conditions are unsatisfactory.

Eugene S. Kelly and Dr. Warren Hunt presented their views on the controversy.

The council also went on record supporting the million dollar road unemployment relief issue proposed for the state highway commission and will forward its recommendation to that group.

Floating Jacket Gives Basis To Drowning Theory

LONG BEACH, Calif., Jan. 28. (AP)—Discovery of a canvas life jacket, floating on the ocean between here and Catalina island, today added to the fear that Seward Madd, president of a Los Angeles auto loan company, and his secretary, Marion Dow, were drowned Sunday.

Search for the missing men was abandoned by the coast guard and navy late today, but one of the craning boats found the life jacket, the only evidence seen since the men disappeared.

Madd and Dow were last seen about 4 p. m. Sunday, when they were speeding southward in a 18-foot power boat. It was feared the boat burned or capsized and they died in the choppy water of the channel.

KANSAS CITY HIT BY HEAVY BLAST

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 28 (Thursday AP)—A heavy explosion shook Kansas City's entire north end early today, damaging more than 300 buildings and destroying one three-story structure.

Although a general call for ambulances was sounded, police said they believed no one had been injured.

The three-story building, evidently the seat of the blast, caught fire after being totally wrecked.

Almost every building north of Eleventh street, in the heart of Kansas City's metropolitan area, was damaged. Windows were blown out for the radius of almost a half mile.
