OREGONIAN READY TO "SAVE NATION"

NEW YORK, Jan. 28. (UP)—With a flourish that many a professional politician would be proud to own, George Edward Stewart, a favorite son of Butte Falls, Ore., today announced that he stands ready to save the nation by running for president.

Stewart is founder, sole owner and lone member of the whip party and he has adopted as his campaign slogan, "keep your whip cracking!"

He announced his candidacy in a 52-paragraph letter from Butte Falls, stating in unequivocal terms just what he will do, once he is in the White House.

Stewart's voluminous letter states that he will not campaign "for the votes of a hungry nation with my mouth full of the food of a banquet table."

"I own," he continues, "a home and a mortgage. I owe money I can't pay. I have a fine car and no gas. I have a fine radio with old tubes. I have one suit of clothes and thank God for it."

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Jan. 28. (UP)—Howard A. Woolverton, 52, wealthy industrialist, returned to his home unharmed shortly before midnight last night just 24 hours after he had been kidnapped and held for \$50,000 cash.

Woolverton apparently had suffered no ill effects from his abduction, one of the most sensational of a series that have brought \$1,000,000 in ransom to a Midwest kidnap gang.

The industrialist immediately went into conference with his family and attorneys. It was impossible to learn at once if a ransom had been paid or promised.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 28. (UP)—Mayor George L. Baker and the city council late today denied a large group of Communists and sympathizers permission to hold a mass meeting February 4 and had the delegation ejected from the council chamber when its members insisted on continuing their pleas.

The group was led by Fred Walker, head of the Communist party in Portland, who as the first speaker declared the council had done nothing to relieve unemployment.

Unemployment and "job insurance" would have been discussed at the mass meeting, Walker said.

Walker was followed by other speakers, some of whom said they were not Communists but sympathized with the present movement.

Get 24 Alarms
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28. (UP)—There was a continuous din of sirens here tonight as fire engines answered 24 alarms between 4 p. m. and 10 p. m. and only one of them was a false alarm.

The most disastrous blaze destroyed a three-story building at Sixteenth and Mission, equipment being called from the downtown district two miles away to fight it. The building was known as Redmen's hall because the lodge occupied the upper rooms. Hardware and grocery stores and a restaurant were on the main floor. Damage was estimated at \$40,000.

ALL of which doesn't answer this supremely important question: "What am I to do when I WANT to work but can't work because no work is to be had?"

If we ever find an answer to that question, we shall have taken the longest step yet along the road that leads to real progress.
