were very large, thus making stocks, which represent OWNERSHIP of industry, very valuable.

With stocks, representing ownership of industry, growing steadily in value, we began to speculate in them, thus running prices up still further until they got out of all reason and the crash came.

IF industry, as its costs of production fell, had lowered its prices to the consumer correspondingly, thus enabling the consumer to buy steadily more and more of the products of industry, all the grief and suffering of this depression, or deflation, period MIGHT have been avoided.

Insight, which is a peculiarly clear and penetrating kind of sight, enables us to see all this quite plainly, now that it is too late and the damage has been done.

About all that remains is for us to benefit in the future, if we can, by this lesson which we have bought and paid for.

AT any rate, the fall in prices in the past two and a half years hasn't been a dead, total loss.

As prices fall, people will be enabled to buy and consume more things. As people buy and consume more things industry will be stimulated and as industry is stimulated more jobs will be created, providing more buying power with which to buy and consume. STILL MORE things.

Thus the cycle which since the fall of 1929 has been working AGAINST us will begin to work FOR us.

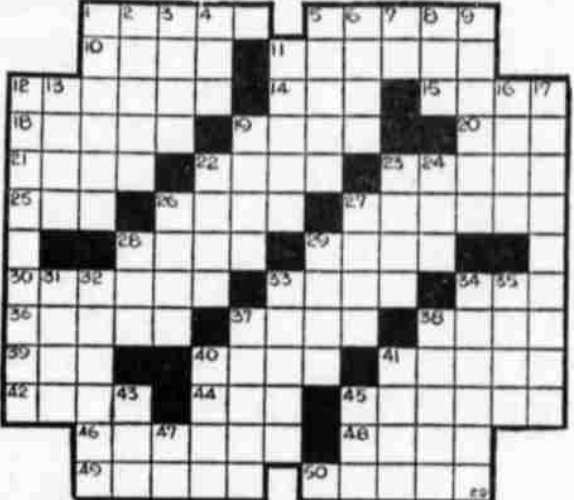

MEXICANS REFUSE HOSPITAL'S HELP

FRESNO, Calif., Jan. 29. (UP)—Many Mexicans in the San Joaquin valley are suffering from the intense pains caused by thallium poison but refuse to enter hospitals for treatment, health authorities said tonight.

At least 10 known to be afflicted, cannot be persuaded that they should accept treatment, even though their lives are in danger.

Five of them are dead. Five are in critical condition, three are seriously ill and nine others have shown positive symptoms of being poisoned.

OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 29. (UP)—Large doses of potassium iodine might temporarily save the lives of California Mexicans stricken with thallium poisoning, Dr. J. C. Munch, department of agriculture toxicologist, said today in an interview with the United Press.

THREE KILLED IN FLORIDA MISHAP

MONTICELLO, Fla., Jan. 29. (UP)—Three men were killed instantly when their plane crashed near the flying field here late Friday.

The dead: Fred Wisner, pilot, Broomfield, Conn.
William Sargeant, 32, formerly of Chicago, now Monticello.
Harvey Watson, 24, Monticello.

Witnesses said a wing appeared to break from the fuselage of the plane as the craft came out of a tail spin at an altitude of about 500 feet.

At least, that is the theory.

THE trouble seems to be that theory isn't always reflected immediately in practice.

Some of the clearer-thinking economists, for example, are telling us that in the big boom years from 1922 to 1929 steadily falling costs of production WEREN'T reflected in steadily falling prices to the consumer, but instead were reflected in SPECULATION.

That is to say, with production costs falling steadily and prices staying up or going even higher, the profits of industry

PORTLAND, Jan. 29. (UP)—Timothy Donivan, Jr., 23, shot and instantly killed his wife, Ida, 22 last night, and fatally wounded himself as a result of jealousy which probably had no basis in fact.

Donivan shot his wife after a quarrel in front of their house, then he sent a bullet from the revolver into his own body.

He started running toward his father's house, then crawled into the basement of another residence and died before police found him.

Jerry Donivan, a brother, said the young couple often quarreled because Donivan was jealous. He said the wife gave him no reason for jealousy.
