denied also.

Edwin S. Cunningham, the American consul-general, talked to the Chinese mayor of Shanghai late last night but said they had discussed nothing of importance. Other consular officials said they knew nothing about the reports of an armistice.

Little groups of Chinese, fighting frantically, were holding off the Japanese at several points while the ramshackle Chinese houses blazed around them and the crash of falling walls punctuated the rattle of gunfire.

Refugees who managed to make their way into the international settlement said the Chinese casualties since the beginning of the occupation ran into the thousands.

The Chinese business men in the settlement closed their shops and banks, and business practically was at a standstill.

Chinese in Statement

The Chinese command issued a statement addressed to the Chinese people, charging Japan with "murdering our people, burning our homes in the Shanghai area, and seeking to create a situation which would give them an excuse for aggression in the Yangtze valley."

"We intend to defend our territory and as long as we have a single man or a single round of ammunition we will oppose

these invaders until they are expelled."

It was revealed early this morning that Japanese consular authorities and Chinese civil officials had arranged for an armistice but that their proposals were rejected by the military leaders.

The military chiefs on both sides said that even should the civil arm agree to an armistice it would have no value in influencing settlement of the present crisis.

Fire, which from six different points ravaged the Chapel section of Shanghai today, caused a horrible slaughter among the 200,000 inhabitants of the city. In addition to the terror of the steady bombing of the section by Japanese airplanes.

The international settlement was threatened seriously, while around the rest of the world an international tension grew that involved the League of Nations at Geneva, Soviet Russia, Great Britain and the United States.

Yen Asks Action

Ambassador W. W. Yen, Chinese spokesman at the league, said in informed circles at Geneva to be acting in close harmony with the United States government, shifted his country's demands for league intervention today, calling on the council to preserve China's integrity under articles ten and fifteen of the covenant which call for drastic action.

The Russian manager of the Chinese Eastern Railway at Harbin, in North Manchuria, where the Japanese have been endeavoring to send troops as a result of fighting there between Chinese factions, denied the use of the railway to Japan for troop transportation, on order of the Soviet government at Moscow.

APPLE, PEAR RATE CUT REQUEST DENIED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (AP)—The interstate commerce commission today refused to permit the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company and the Northern Pacific railroad to reduce rates on apples and pears for export from the Yakima valley to Portland.

In the same decision the commission refused to permit the railroad serving the Walla Walla valley to reduce rates on apples and pears for export to Tacoma, Seattle and Portland.

The refusal to permit a reduction between the Yakima valley and Portland was due to the circumstance that the Portland rate would have been less than that to Tacoma and Seattle.

The proposed Walla Walla valley rate was ordered cancelled because it would have violated the long-short haul provision of the interstate commerce commission act and would be in the opinion of the commission, have given Walla Walla valley producers an undue advantage over Yakima valley producers.

Before the council adjourned Sato registered his reservations to the chairman's ruling and reminded the council it was necessary to proceed very slowly "in a matter which might so gravely compromise the peace of the world."

Jointly Owned

The Chinese Eastern railway is jointly owned by Russia and China. Hsi Hsia, governor of Kirin province, has been fighting a force led by Ting Chao, commander of the railway guards. Japan attempted to send a body of troops to Harbin, to protect its citizens there, the government said.

M. Kuznetoff, Russian manager of the railway, forbade the transport of the troops over the line on orders from the Russian government at Moscow. M. Kuznetoff pointed out that Russia had refused to transport Chinese troops southward at the time the Japanese invaded the Nonni river bridge area near Tsitsihar, and that Japan had suggested that neutrality be observed.

Statement Given

Late today it was authoritatively stated the Japanese government would hold officials of the railway responsible for any delay in the troop movement to Harbin, and the accountability would be extended to any damage done Japanese subjects as a result of the fighting in and around the city.

The Japanese Consul General Ohashi at Harbin reported that the Russian officials had acted on Moscow instructions and Hsi Hsia reported in effect that the board of directors of the railway, which is partly Chinese and partly Russian, ordered the destruction of a bridge at Sungari, which delayed the troop movements a day or two. The consul general said the bridge was dynamited, and the Japanese soldiers were compelled to abandon their trains.

They crossed the river at Tsinghai and started marching on foot for Harbin.

Other reports, however, placed the blame for these delays on Ting Chao's troops.
