POLICE MILK FUND NEARLY EXHAUSTED

The city police milk fund is nearly exhausted, due to the heavy demand for milk and the increasing lack of ability of fathers and mothers to pay for the milk which their children need, Chief of Police Gay Merrill stated Friday.

The fund, which at one time totaled nearly \$800, is now nearly without funds, and money will have to be raised to assist in the payment of January bills, the chief said.

All donations to the milk fund will be gratefully received, he stated. Money is used to buy milk for school students' lunches, where their parents are unable to afford to purchase the milk, and for use of children in homes of unemployed and needy persons. All cases are investigated before relief is given.

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KLAMATH COWS WIN BUTTERFAT LEAD IN STATE

Two Klamath county cows led the state for the month of December in amount of butterfat produced, according to records received from Oregon State College extension division authorities.

Skyler, a grade Holstein owned by E. T. McLaughlin, was second with a production record of 2495 pounds of milk containing 93.7 pounds of butterfat.

Records compiled by Earl Gardner, Klamath county Cow Testing Association tester, show that J. C. Wright's herd was the high producing herd in the county for the month of December with an average per cow of 896 pounds of milk and 36.6 pounds of butterfat; for herds of over 20 cows William Williams had the high herd average of 35 pounds of butterfat, and for herds of less than 15 cows U. E. Heeder was high with a record of 23.4 pounds per cow.

Records for the year show the following herds in order of production per cow for the year: Earl Mack, 476.3; A. Pinelli, 398.7; E. T. McLaughlin, 386.2; G. W. Timson, 385; J. C. Wright, 380.4; Leonard Lewis, 364.4.

For herds of less than 15 cows the Earl Mack herd was high with Timson's herd second; from 12 to 20 cows, McLaughlin's herd first and J. C. Wright's second; over 20 cows, A. Pinelli herd first and Leonard Lewis second.

Officials Go To Sparrow Funeral

Members of the Klamath county court, Judge Fred R. Goddard and Commissioners Silas Olson, chain and Charles R. Williams, and County Clerk C. R. Delap, attended the funeral in Medford Friday of County Judge Alex Sparrow.

Judge Sparrow died in a Klamath Falls hospital last Sunday night following head injuries received when he fell in a pit in the basement of the Hirvi building.

Large Rum Fine Turnover Is Made
Fines for liquor law violations in January totaled \$457.25 in the Tule Lake district, according to the monthly report and turnover submitted to County Treasurer Clara DeVall by Justice of the Peace Charles Dodenhoff.

This turnover is the largest sum collected in prohibition fines by any justice in Klamath county since September, according to the county treasurer.

500 Deer Seen On S. P. Modoc Line By Rail Officials

Over 500 deer were seen Thursday afternoon about 4 o'clock along the right of way of the Southern Pacific Modoc line between Perez and Corvallis, a distance of about 8 miles. It was reported by L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent of the railroad, who with Superintendent J. W. Fitzgerald of the Shasta division, visited Alturas.

One drove of over 200 deer were seen. The deer were standing along the fenced right of way looking at the train and feeding on juniper trees.

There is three feet of snow on Glass mountain at the present time, Graham stated.

BILL FOR FOREST EXTENSION IS IN

A bill for the extension of Fremont Forest has been introduced into congress by a member of the Oregon delegation, and is at present in the hands of the committee on public lands, according to a letter from Congressman Robert H. Butler to the local chamber of commerce.

The Fremont forest at the present time extends nearly to the Lakeview highway, and if the bill now before congress is passed, the boundaries will be extended over the highway. This bill was introduced in the hopes of preserving the timber along public highways.

The Kwana Lumber company, which owns timber adjacent to the Lakeview highway, has signified its willingness to exchange this for timber more remote from the road. The company will be allowed to do this if the present bill is passed.

CARDS MAILED TO REGISTERED VOTERS IN CITY

Cards were mailed out Thursday to all registered voters inside the city limits of Klamath Falls by the county clerk's office, giving the name of the voter as registered and the precinct number. The number of precincts in the city has been increased from 23 to 25, which causes some voters to be in a different precinct than they formerly were.

If no card is received the citizen will know that he is not registered to vote and if he so desires should register at the county clerk's office in the court house before 5 p. m. April 19, the last day registration.

If the precinct number and mail address are incorrect, the voter should notify the clerk's office by telephone or in person at once, it is stated.

Addresses as registered have been compared with the post office mail address list of persons in the city and are as near correct as can be obtained, although changes in addresses are expected.

No count of the total number of persons registered to date has been made.

Federal Building Walks Kept Clear

Sidewalks on the federal property around the new federal building are being kept free from snow and salt is sprinkled daily on them, it was pointed out Friday by postal officials.

"It is not because of any city ordinance, but because the United States treasury department orders the work done to prevent accidents and injuries to persons," the postmaster states. He recommended the same policy for local merchants and home owners.

PINE SHIPMENTS EXCEED CUTS

PORTLAND, Jan. 29. (AP)—Shipments and orders exceeded by nearly 32 per cent the production in the Western Pine territory for the week ending January 23. This was shown today in the report of the Western Pine association, whose member mills operate in Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, Oregon and Washington.

Of the 123 reporting mills only 27 were operating, and these at an average of 26.3 per cent of capacity.

Total production for the week was 11,336,000 feet; shipments totaled 32,872,000 feet, and orders 22,253,000 feet. Unfilled orders decreased 619,000 feet.

Current new business decreased 2,846,000 feet, or 7.3 per cent under the previous week. Production was 845,000 feet less, and shipments decreased 388,000 feet.
