Since its inception they have met nearly every two weeks at the home of the members ranging alphabetically.

Soon after their organization they learned that the Shasta View school was in need of a musical instrument. Their finances were somewhat limited, having \$1.75 in the treasury. Within a very short time they gave an entertainment in connection with a box social, the society furnishing the boxes, 50 in number. The proceeds netted \$55.90, their first contribution.

They were soon called upon to assist in the Red Cross work and responded by meeting every week to sew or whatever came for them to do and their first entertainment for this work netted nearly \$200.00. By this time they had gained five new members, and it might be of interest to some to know that during their "pioneer days" there were no cars in this section, "Old Dobbin" and his running mate hitched to a hack or sleigh gathered up all the women and children.

Since that time they have helped purchase a piano for the high school at Malin, one for the Community hall, nearly furnished the hall kitchen and helped pay other bills needed in its construction. They hold a bazaar in connection with an entertainment by local talent once a year which nets from \$125.00 to \$160.00 which is used in this community for various purposes.

For two years, since the call for relief work they have had charge of this work and this year in connection with the Malin Commercial club were responsible for the collection of money and supplies which afforded Christmas cheer for all children and many grown-ups in the community and the work is still in progress.

Highway Costs To Be Presented State Commission

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29, (AP)—
 Figures showing that the average monthly payroll for administrative and engineering employees of the state highway department is 4.71 percent of total expenditures are to be presented to the state highway commission at its February meeting.

The average monthly payroll is \$59,845.11. It was shown by a report today. Administrative functions cost \$13,462.96, or 22 percent of all expenses. Monthly cost of construction engineering is 2.97 and of surveys and plans .75 percent of all expenditures. A majority of the commission agreed at a recent informal meeting to reduce administrative expenses by 30 percent.
