

## HIGHWAY BOND RESOLUTIONS ARE RECEIVED

J. A. Gordon of the executive committee of the citizen's relief organization has received word from the office of J. C. Alinsworth, chairman of the state highway commission, of the receipt of the resolution and letters from the executive committee.

In the resolution to the commission and the letter to Alinsworth the executive committee pointed out the necessity for additional relief work in Klamath county and endorsed the proposed million dollar issue of highway bonds for relief employment.

Mr. Alinsworth is recovering from a double fracture of the right arm sustained in a fall on a slippery sidewalk and is expected to be able to attend to business by the end of this week, his secretary states.

The letter of acknowledgment from Mr. Alinsworth's secretary states in part:

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 22nd inst., relative to the serious unemployment situation in your county, and to advise that immediately upon his return tomorrow, this will be brought to his attention.

"In the meantime copies of your letter have been sent to the other two commissioners, to Mr. Roy A. Klein, attorney, and to Mr. J. M. Devers, engineer, for their attention and study."

## COUNTY C. O. P. MEETING HELD ON THURSDAY

Members of the Klamath county republican central committee met Thursday night in the county court room at the court house to consider present conditions, the proposed to issue a million dollars in state highway bonds for relief employment work, and discuss committee business.

Major C. H. Underwood, chairman of the committee, presided and the committee appointed Walter Zimmerman, Chiloquin banker, a member of the committee succeeding Ralph Farmer, former Chiloquin attorney.

Major Underwood will appoint a committee to draft a resolution regarding the highway bond proposal and the resolution will be submitted to the committee in an adjourned session next Friday night at the court house.

Major Underwood requests that all members of the central committee attend the session as plans to carry on the party's campaign this coming year will be outlined in order that an early start may be made in the presidential nominating committee year.

It was the sense of committee members that the committee will be unable to assist any candidates in the primary election but that immediately following the nomination of the party's candidates at the primary election the committee will start assisting in their campaigns.

## CORKINS TO HEAR ACCRETION TRIAL

SALEM, Jan. 29. (AP)—Judge O. M. Corkins of Lakeview was assigned by Chief Justice Henry J. Bean today to try the case of S. O. Johnson versus the Great Northern railroad. He replaces Judge W. M. Duncan of Klamath Falls, who has been disqualified. The case is said to involve important property rights, but the date of trial had not been set.

The Johnson vs. Great Northern case regards the title to accretion lands along lower Klamath lake which are claimed by the state of Oregon which gave a quit claim deed to the railroad for \$1000, and for which Johnson claims to have a quit claim deed from the Enterprise Land and Investment company. The land involved is below the 1872 meander line as shown by the survey of the government. The Great Northern started to put in a fill upon which to build a railroad line to connect at the Klamath river bridge and turn southward toward the Shaw-Bertram mill and the Great Northern main line south from Klamath Falls to avoid having to back track north and then southward.

age and decreased student fees complicated the situation.

If the voters at the November election sustain the referendum, Sammons said, he fears the 1933 legislature might construe that vote as a mandate to discontinue further appropriations for the board of higher education. This, he declared, would force the schools to continue with no aid other than millage taxes and student fees.

The chairman of the finance committee, said retrenchment of funds for conduct of the university has been no more drastic than it has for the state college or either of the three normal schools, although he explained that since the medical school and Doernbecher hospital, which receive no millage money, did not receive the \$653,525 legislative appropriation by reason of the referendum, it has been necessary for the university to draw on its already insufficient funds to keep the medical school and hospital open. This cut into the university funds, forcing it into a retrenchment program which, Sammons said, has been most drastic.

The actual expenditure of the schools in the year July 1, 1930 to June 30, 1931, were \$4,961,929. Last summer, faced with its enforced retrenchment program, the board cut this figure in its 1931-32 budget to \$3,948,345.

The university's expenditures, Sammons said, for 1930-31 were \$1,439,593. This was budgeted for the present year at \$1,214,191.

Oregon State spent \$2,428,375 in 1930-31. It was budgeted by the board at \$2,089,359 for this year.

Van Vactor, and in his zeal to obtain facts on charges placed by "Detective" George Donahue oversteps the bounds of a prosecutor's oath and license, Gillenwaters states.

Members of the Kikans and Lions club are moving to block the attempts of the show on the grounds that Gillenwaters is objecting to an improper time, and that his charges are irrelevant, immaterial and have no bearing on the question. The question is still being sought, and no action has been taken seriously, kangaroo court officials state.

## HOPE ABANDONED FOR CREW IN SUB

PORTLAND, England, Jan. 29. (AP)—The last straw of hope for the rescue alive of any of the 51 men and officers who went down with the British submarine M-2 last Tuesday was snatched away today by the publication of an admiralty statement saying it was no longer possible to hope.

The statement, which was based upon a report of the rear admiral in charge of submarines, said, however, that the search of the sea floor for the ill-fated submarine would be continued.

Relatives Lose Hope

The object sought by divers yesterday on the theory it might be the M-2 was found to be an old wreck, the admiral

said, and the succeeding search will be conducted at another spot where a former sweep brought up two submarine hand flags in a canvas case.

Distressed wives and relatives of the men, groups of whom have been waiting tearfully but hopefully at the gates of the dockyard here since the search began, lost their last crumb of comfort with the admiralty's announcement.

**Oil On Surface**

The reception of what were thought to be "sub-surface signals" by the hydrophone of the destroyer Thurstor, which was assisting in the rescue work, added impetus to the labors of the navy's crews, labors which now have definitely been declared without reward.

Today large quantities of oil bubbled up to the surface in West bay, not far from where oil patches were discovered yesterday. The sea was comparatively calm, and the salvage flotilla entered the oil patch, but by midday they had not succeeded in locating its source.

## TONE IS HEAVY ON STOCK MART

NEW YORK, Jan. 29. (AP)—The stock market endeavored to rally in the last hour today, and recovered much of an early slump, but the list turned heavy again in the final few minutes, and there were numerous net losses of 1 to 2 points at the finish, although coppers were higher.

Sales approximated 1,500,000 shares.

FOLSOM PRISON, Cal., Jan. 29. (AP)—William Henry Burkhardt, 29, was hanged here today for the murder of Ann McKnight Burkhardt, his wife, in Los Angeles in 1930. The gallows trap was sprung at 10:03 a. m., and Burkhardt was pronounced dead at 10:16 a. m.
