ALTURAS, (Modoc Co.)—What the Redding-Alturas lateral of the state highway is an all year around route through the Sierras has been proven during the present winter of deep snow. In spite of the heavy snowstorms which have occurred from time to time the route has never been closed to traffic for more than a few hours until the state snows had a chance to go through. Traffic over this route has grown enormously during the past couple of years since the highway extends on from this place over the Warner mountains to Juripree Valley and the California-Nevada line. Alturas is also the junction point for travel from the Sacramento Valley to Lake County, Oregon and points in the southern Oregon territory. Meanwhile just over the line in Nevada clear through to the Black Rock desert, Winnemucca and the Humboldt river following the old immigrant trail of the 50's there is very little snow the only impediment in the way of winter auto travel being adobe flats on the unsurfaced roads.

Winema Is Newest Town In Great Tule Lake District

WINEMA, Calif. (Special)—Winema is located on the west side of Tule Lake, "The Broad Basket of Klamath Basin."

It takes its name from the school district which in turn has taken the name from the Indian woman who was so prominent during the Modoc war, fought within a few miles from the little school. Captain Jack's stronghold, Canby's Cross and the famous ice caves, to which Captain O. C. Applegate leads curious travelers, each year, are located about 12 miles to the southwest. Those familiar with the reclamation history in this country know that Tule Lake has no outlet. Its only outlet is Lost River. By building the diversion canal, which carries the water into the Klamath river, it was drained, making a vast area of land which is very fertile and suited to the raising of all kinds of grain, alfalfa hay and potatoes.

Farms, located in the sheltered areas of the Tule Lake basin, have been known to raise ripe tomatoes, watermelon, cantaloupes and cucumbers and an abundance of corn and string beans.

The first homesteads were opened in this district in 1922. Five years later they opened another tract with the usual preference to ex-service men. After 90 days the remaining tracts were opened to others and all were taken.
