Good Card Verbally Assured

Monday's Fight Program Will Be Excellent, so Say the Sayers. Snell Eager for Nationalists. Portland Manager Does Not Know Becker.

Decorated details from two sources, Herb Owen, Klamath Falls promoter, and Ted Seakid, manager of the Whitehouse Athletic club of Portland, assert, re-assure, assure, and re-assure the splendor of Monday night's fight program at the Legion hall.

If Young Nationalista, a veteran pugman despite his youthful appellation, was brusquely ordered from the arena in Portland earlier this week with the odor of a "no contest" match hanging about his bronzed Filipino shoulders, he will be carried from the Legion hall circle—so says Doc Snell, and so says Tex Seakid. (Tex' last name may be right or it may be wrong, but right or wrong its present spelling is more desirable than his penmanship).

Of course, this fellow Tex is particularly interested in the work of Doc Snell, and his note may be a bit biased. He also has holdings in Red Stanley, Pete Becker's rival in the six-round semi-windup. He predicts an uncomfortable Monday for Pete, and writes, "This fellow Becker better be in shape and be able to fight."

Tex doesn't know Becker. Pete can fight, and he always is in shape.

Another thing from Tex: The Portland manager is rabid on the subject of a Steamboat Jackson-Stanley fight. Stanley, so it is written, will sink the old Steamboat easily.

There is no doubt of Snell's ability as a scrapper, but if Young Nationalista still is anywhere near the Class A fighter he was a few years ago, Bud Ambrose, whose Snell has picked out on the last card, will come to resemble the softness of a Hy-pad.

Up in Portland Snell works at his fighting as hard and as often as he eats. According to Seakid, the youngster has fought five and six rounds each day and trots down the road five miles each morning before breakfast.

Owen has announced the curtain raiser, and in Herb's words it will be a "classic." This poor old word, classic, has been used so often and with such varying interpretations, it is difficult to understand just what a "classic" might be.

Anyway, Murray Brittain, Klamath Falls boy, will open the card against Fat Kerr, Cottage Grove. Both fellows are heavyweights.

Owen has taken Nationalista into tow, and will conduct him to Klamath Falls under personal observation. All along the way the promoter will talk fight and Doc Snell, and by the time the car rolls into the city limits the tropical blooded battler should be in turmoil.

Another distinguished foreigner will come to Klamath Falls to bow to the Legion hall audience Monday. He will be Walter "Sesee" Achu, the only full-blooded Chinese wrestler in captivity on the coast. Achu will wrestle on the next mat program here.

COAST FIGHTER HAS BIG EDGE ON CHICAGOAN

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. (UP)—Max Baer of California won a decision over King Levinsky of Chicago in a 10-round heavyweight bout last night. Baer held a clear point advantage over the Chicagoan. He weighed 202 pounds and Levinsky 192 1/2.

The decision of the three officials was unanimous and followed pre-fight predictions. Baer weighed 202 pounds and Levinsky 192 1/2. The fight attracted a crowd of nearly 12,000 who paid \$21,000.

Levinsky won the first round. He stunned Baer with a violent two-fisted attack to the head. From that round on, while Baer absorbed much punishment, he held the upper hand.

Early in the second round Baer signalled Levinsky to come on. Levinsky did. He gave Max everything he had, but Max laughed inanely.

In the third round Levinsky all but fell after missing the mark with a wildly thrown right to the head. In the next round Baer wrestled with the King, tried to throw him to the floor, and nearly fell through the ropes himself.

So furiously were they fighting at the end of both the third and fourth rounds that Referee Gunboat Smith, himself a former heavyweight, had difficulty in halting the action.

The fight was fought in the first five rounds. The last half consisted of distance sniping, with Baer proving the best marksman.

RECORD BREAKING RISE PREDICTED

CHICAGO, Jan. 30. (AP)—Four formidable custies, one of them a dark horse, were clustered today at the top of the world's three cushion billiard tournament standings although Otto Reisel of Philadelphia still topped them all. The three besides Reisel were Augie Kleckhefer, the star Chicago southpaw, only a half game behind the pace-setter; Gus Copulos, the Eugene, Ore., veteran whose spectacular victories have brought him prominence and third place, and Arthur Thornblad of Chicago, the defending champion, who ranked fourth.

It became apparent these four would fight it out for the title as only 19 more days of play remained. Jake Schaefer, the young 18.2 ballline king, seemed definitely out of the picture, with three wins and as many defeats.

Reisel displayed brilliant form last night to beat F. S. Scoville of Buffalo, 59 to 38 in 47 innings and stretch his victories to 6 against 1 defeat. Kleckhefer defeated Len Kenney of Chicago, 59 to 48 in 46 innings and had five wins to one defeat.

Copulos, for years a familiar figure in the billiard world, won his fifth straight game, 59 to 45 in 54 innings, from Tiff Denton of Kansas City. He had lost his first two starts.

RIOTING ENDED

BOMBAY, Jan. 29. (UP)—The most riotous day in Bombay since the nationalist "Satyagraha" was proclaimed ended late tonight with the police in control of the situation, but with one dead, 20 seriously injured, and more than 200 wounded as the result of repeated police charges against Hindu mobs.

DISQUALIFICATION RUMOR CAUSES ROW

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Jan. 30. (UP)—Considerable excitement was caused here today by the apparently erroneous announcement that eight members of the American bob-sled teams, including Jay O'Brien, chairman of the American Olympic bob-sled committee, were disqualified from entrance in the North American bob-sled championships here Sunday and Monday.

Ralph J. Ury, chairman of the registration committee of the Adirondack Association of the A. A. U., made the announcement. However, higher officials of the A. A. U. claim that Ury had no authority to make such an announcement and that it was entirely erroneous.

The higher officials explained that Ury's disqualifications apparently were based on the fact that these men, as yet, had not received "traveling cards" from their home A. A. U. divisions. They pointed out that absence of the cards could not cause their disqualification until the day of the championships, as they might receive their cards before then.

Huskies Defeat Montana Quintet

SEATTLE, Jan. 30. (AP)—The rejuvenated University of Washington Huskies continued their recently-acquired winning ways here last night when they handed the University of Montana basketball team a 44-16 defeat.

The Grizzlies were swamped from the start, Washington counting 13 points before their opponents scored, and holding a commanding lead throughout the contest. A second game will be played here tonight.
