

# Snell Faces Young Nationalista Monday Night

## STANLEY WILL MEET BECKER IN SEMI EVENT

All fighters who are to appear on Herb Owen's fight card at the Legion hall tonight have arrived in Klamath and are ready to go and no substitutes are necessary, the promoter announced Monday morning. Nationalista, Farmer and Kerr arrived Sunday night and Snell, Stewart and McCloud landed in this city by motor at 2 a. m. Monday after leaving Portland Sunday morning and coming by way of Bend.

Young Doc Snell, Portland, will entertain a cherished ambition, and Young Nationalista, Los Angeles Filipino, will encourage the remnants of a battered reputation in the Legion hall Monday night at 8:30. The main event battle on Herb Owen's third promotion in Klamath Falls will be characterized by a youngster's uphill fight against a seasoned ring master clinging to one of the most outstanding records in Pacific coast bantam circles.

The lithe, brown islander, Nationalista, will be making his first appearance in Klamath Falls. The Filipino has barnstormed the entire country, winning and losing to the best bantam boxers in the nation, and though his personality has never been thrust into the Legion hall, his reputation has been heard.

Snell beat Ambrose, a comparatively untrained youngster, earned his position as main eventer on Owen's card through a sensational knockout victory over Buddy Ambrose, Salem. The two tiny, impetuous bantams, scurried around the ring four rounds until Snell's superior punch brought along a knockout.

Red Stanley, stablemate to Snell, will appear against Pete Becker, Klamath Falls, in the six-round semi wind-up. Stanley has not fought here for some time, but he will still be remembered under the Water matches making regime. Becker will enter the ring a slight favorite. The newly installed Klamath Falls resident won a brilliant left-handed victory several weeks ago over Chief Thomas, Coquille, and then turned wrestler the following week to defeat Pat Reagan, Seattle. Both Becker and Stanley have been considered for a bout with Steamboat Jackson, and the loser will be automatically eliminated from the prospective fight.

Jackson Moved Up  
Johnny Jackson, stocky Chiloquin Indian, will meet Bud McCloud, Vancouver, Wash., in his first six-round appearance. A long succession of victories in the preliminary class so impressed Matchmaker Owen he immediately promoted the Chiloquin man.

Three four-round preliminaries in which Klamath Falls men will take outstanding parts will introduce the trio of special six-rounders. The most recent addition to the opening bouts was announced Friday. This was the curtain raiser in which Murray Brittain, Klamath Falls, will meet Fat Keras, heavyweight from Cottage Grove.

Buss Zimmerman, Klamath Falls, vs Russell Howard, Klamath Falls.

## Philadelphian Leads Cueists

CHICAGO, Feb. 1. (AP)—With fifty of the sixty-six games completed Otto Reisel, the Philadelphia veteran holds a full game lead over the rest of the field in the world's championship three-cushion billiard tournament. Reisel, although idle since last Friday night received some help last night when two favorites were turned back. Reisel has won six games and lost one and has four left, all against formidable foes.

Angie Kleckhoffer of Chicago, missed a chance to tie Reisel last night but he was surprised by the veteran Frank Scoville of Buffalo, the eastern champion, losing by 50 to 25 in 56 innings. This defeat dropped Kleckhoffer into a tie with Art Thurblad, the defending titleholder, with five won and two lost.

Gus Copulos of Eugene, Ore., was beaten by Len Kenney of Chicago, 50 to 32 in 47 innings. Both Kenney and Scoville took early leads and never gave ground.

## DEMPSEY BARRED BY BOXING ASSOCIATION

CHICAGO, Feb. 1. (AP)—Jack Dempsey had won his second round with the Mississippi athletic commission today, but this comeback campaign will be at stake when the issue comes to a showdown one week from today. The commission lifted its order suspending Dempsey because of his boxing show he refereed at Columbus, Miss., in the fall of 1930, were unpaid. It also announced it would send a representative, Col. H. I. Landry, to a hearing before the National Boxing Association February 8 at Chicago.

Meanwhile, Leonard Sachs, Dempsey's manager, went ahead with plans for exhibition bouts for the former world heavyweight champion in Milwaukee, February 8, and Chicago, February 15.

CHICAGO, Feb. 1. (AP)—Jack Dempsey was barred today from all territory controlled by the National Boxing Association until payment was made of debts incurred in connection with his exhibition appearance in Mississippi while on a tour of the south.

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 1. (AP)—Jack Dempsey said today he was "not worried" when informed he had been barred from territory controlled by the National Boxing Association. He declared the move would not affect his coming fight tour of the middle west.

Dempsey explained debts in connection with an exhibition trip through southern states a year or two ago were incurred by a promoter, whose name he could not recall. Non-payment of these debts was the reason for Dempsey being barred by the N. B. A.

(AP)—Whether Washington State college will romp away with the northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball championship, or be forced to battle it out with Oregon State and the University of Washington will virtually be decided this week end, when the Cougars clash with the O. S. C. Heavers at Pullman, Wash.

An easy win over Idaho while Oregon was noosing out a surprise victory over Oregon State Saturday night gave Washington State a strong hold on the first place in the race at about the half way mark. The cougars trounced Idaho 13 to 11 at Moscow, Idaho, and Oregon defeated the Heavers 21 to 20 at Eugene.

Washington, defending champion, swung back into the title battle last Monday and Tuesday with a pair of victories over Oregon at Eugene. The Huskies defeated Montana in two non-conference games here Friday and Saturday.

Tomorrow night W. S. C. again tackles Idaho at Moscow, and Friday and Saturday Oregon meets Washington at Seattle and Washington State tangles with Oregon State in their crucial series at Pullman. Two victories over the Heavers will just about assure Washington State of the championship.
