WAR NEWS SENDS WHEAT CLIMBING

CHICAGO, Feb. 1, (P)—War developments took the place of crop damage as the chief factor in the grain markets.

Largely as the result of a rapid succession of reports indicating broader clashes in the Orient, wheat jumped 2 1/2c a bushel. Active general buying of wheat future deliveries accompanied the surge in prices, but heavy selling to realize profits led to material reactions from the day's top level.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4c to 1 1/2c above Saturday's finish, corn 1/4c to 1/2c up, oats 1/4c to 1/2c advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 10c.

STOCKS RALLY AND SHOW GOOD GAINS

NEW YORK, Feb. 1, (P)—Stocks rallied today under the combined influence of the railroad wage cut and efforts of bullish professionals to mark up stocks of companies which they

thought might be affected by possible conflict in the Far East. Leading issues ranged \$1 to \$4 higher at the top. United States Steel common closed at \$41, up \$1.62. American Telephone's close was \$115.37, or \$4 higher. Dupont gained \$2.25 net to \$53.75; Allied Chemical \$2.37, to \$59.35. American Express, Union Pacific \$2 to \$7.75; Standard Oil of New Jersey \$1.75 to \$7.35; New York Central \$1.75 to \$20.62.

Douglas Aircraft and United Aircraft gained more than \$1 each. The turnover amounted to about 1,600,000 shares.
