The fifth annual Grange Lecturers' School for Southeastern Oregon will be held at Henley Friday evening and all day on Saturday. The Friday evening meeting will start at 7:30 p. m., with State Master C. C. Hulet presiding. This meeting is open to anyone, whether they are grange members or not. Grange members are particularly requested to attend.

The major address of the evening will be given by James C. Farmer, national grange lecturer. Paul V. Maria, director of extension, Oregon State College, will deliver an address on "Grange Lecturers' Schools, Past, Present and Future," and Mrs. Marie Flint McCall, state grange lecturer, will discuss "What to Expect from the Lecture School Tomorrow."

Group singing will be led by James C. Farmer and musical numbers will be furnished by local granges.

The program for Saturday, February 6, is as follows: Morning session will start at 10 o'clock, with call to order by Mrs. McCall, Oregon lecturer, after which James C. Farmer will lead in group singing. Opening address will be delivered by Mrs. McCall at 10:20, and at 10:50 an entertainment number will be given by lecturer of Klamath Pomona grange. At 11:50 o'clock Mr. Farmer will deliver an address on "Program Material for Grange Lecturers, How to Get It and How to Use It." A committee of local Pomona grange is arranging a luncheon from 12 to 1:15 p. m. at Henley.

The meeting will again convene at 1:15 and after some group singing, C. C. Hulet, state grange master for Oregon, will lecture on "Up-building of the Grange." At 2 o'clock the Pomona grange will put on an entertainment number followed by round-table discussion led by Mr. Farmer. At 3:30 Paul V. Maria, director of extension service, will lead the discussion on worthwhile topics for the lecture hour. Miss Claribel Nye, state leader of home economics extension, will discuss that angle of grange work. From 4 to 5 local grange lecturers will lead the discussion on lecture material and give suggestions to follow on program arrangement.

At the Front

FREDERICK KUH reports and interprets news of the Manchurian crisis for readers of newspapers using United Press service.



FREDERICK KUH, United Press Staff Correspondent, and writer on international affairs, now at the front in Manchuria

THE center of world news attention has shifted to Manchuria, and the newspaper with United Press wire service is PREPARED. Frederick Kuh, staff correspondent, was sent across Siberia to join forces with Demaree C. Bess, U. P. Peiping manager, now at Mukden, and others of the Oriental staff, to cover the biggest war story since 1918. Kuh's long service with the United Press at Berlin, Washington and Moscow, his work with the League of Nations, and his close contact with Russian affairs, qualify him as an expert on the world significance of the events in Manchuria.
