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Is Junior College Coming?

POST GRADUATE WORK INTERESTS

Anti-War Sentiment Cited

Possibility At Least Interesting

In the growth of the post graduate division of Klamath Union high school there is food for interesting conjecture.

There are more than thirty such students at this time, and the demand for this service has been increasing steadily. It has been stimulated undoubtedly by prevailing conditions, with jobs as hard to find as is the money to pay for a year away from home at college.

Does this increasing post graduate activity of the high school presage the development of a junior college movement? It is an interesting if not an immediate possibility.

With the state university and state college burdened with more students than they can take care of with reduced funds, and with limitation rather than expansion in prospect for these institutions, it is not improbable that there will be a tendency toward junior college development in the state.

Furthermore, the location in the Willamette valley of all of the state's four-year higher educational institutions lends encouragement to the growth of some such activity to answer sectional and local needs. This situation was recognized by the outside commission which surveyed Oregon higher education two years ago, and one of the recommendations of that commission was the development of junior college work at the normal schools to help care for sectional needs.

The development of standardized work which will either lead into upper division study at one of the four-year institutions or will, in two years, give the student opportunity for a general background education in the fundamentals, is the mission of the junior college. For many students, two years of study above high school is sufficient. For many others, junior college means the chance for a college degree because of the economies involved in receiving the first two years' study close at home.

We neither predict nor recommend. We merely cite an interesting situation, because we believe it has possibilities. We shall see what happens.

Encouragement Lent To Arms Conference

They opened a world disarmament conference at Geneva Tuesday. It seems paradoxical that at the same time there existed in the Far East a situation which constitutes the most serious threat to international peace since the World war.

Yet the Associated Press dispatch reported that the conference was opened in an atmosphere of more encouragement than was expected, due to this very situation in the Orient. For this has led to a united stand of the great powers against the Far Eastern hostilities.

The reaction to the sanguinary news from the Orient leaves no question as to the contempt in which war is held by a majority of world opinion. The governments of the leading powers are on sound footing when they protest. This demonstration of world sentiment against war should lend encouragement and assurance to the efforts at Geneva to further the cause of permanent international peace.

Earlier Days

February 3, 1914.
At noon today there were registered 402 persons, out of a total of between 4,000 and 5,000 who are eligible to cast their ballots at the May primaries and the November general election. The books are open in the clerk's office.

The ordinance prohibiting the sale of liquor northward of the sale of liquor in Klamath Falls will not be submitted to the voters of the city at the May election. Instead, the "wet" and "dry" question will be placed on the ballot next fall.

Alleging that the assessment of 15 cents an acre levied by the directors of the Klamath Water Users association for the maintenance of the association is far too high, petitions are now being circulated among the water users under the Klamath project, demanding a reduction. These petitions will be presented at Saturday's meeting of the board of directors.

If satisfactory terms can be agreed upon between the reclamation commission and the Water Users association, and the majority of the water users desire such a change, the operation, maintenance and management of the first unit of the Klamath project will be turned over to the association.

Acting upon an order from the Department of the Interior, Ranger H. E. Momyer of Crater Lake National park left this morning with Crater Lake as his destination. He went from here to the Fort today, and tomorrow, in company with Messrs. Utter and Burns, he will start on snowshoes from the Utter and Burns sawmill.

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Health Talks

Jaundice merely refers to the yellow color of the skin and the other tissues of the body due to abnormal content in the blood of material derived from bile. Bile is the material which is found in the gallbladder, but which is developed in the liver. The liver is the largest organ in the body. In the liver the broken-down material from red blood cells is converted and sent to the gallbladder through the bile channels. When the bile is not properly eliminated, the person develops a sallow complexion with slight yellowness of the whites of the eyes, the undersurface of the tongue, and occasionally of the palms of the hands and the soles of the feet. In some cases the entire body may be quite yellow.

Jaundice may, therefore, result from an excessive formation of the bile material, from damage to the liver so that the liver cells do not pour out the bile, but let it get back into the blood, and finally from obstruction to the excretion of bile through the bile tract.

In case of obstruction due to stones in the gallbladder or to other conditions which block the bile passages, the method of treatment is obviously an attempt to unblock the passages by surgical or by other means. In certain infectious diseases the amount of bile formed may be so excessive as to throw undue burden on the liver and bile passages.

The toxic type of case in which there has been damage to the liver, demands the most careful study as to the cause of the damage and to the elimination of such causes if the condition is to be cured. The cause may be an infection. It may be the result of poisoning with various metallic poisonings or with the by-products of bile formation.

In any instance the toxic substances must be eliminated. For instance, in jaundice due to intoxication by arsenic, it is customary first to stop the administration of the arsenic and second to give a preparation which counteracts the arsenic. In case of infection, treatment must be directed toward building the body's resistance to the infection. When the infection is overcome the jaundice disappears.
