

WOOL MARKET IS SLIGHTLY SLOWER

BOSTON, Feb. 5, (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin of Boston will say of the wool market to-morrow:

"The market is a bit slower this week than it was in January. Fine and half blood wools have been in chief demand, with the latter grade most keenly sought. Medium wools are firm but in less eager demand. Woolen wools move moderately well at generally steady prices.

"Foreign primary markets have been very firm, and in Australia and New Zealand a bit higher, apparently, on account of Japanese war buying. London closed with values very firm, especially on fine cross breeds.

"Demand for women's wear fabrics is continuing moderately good, although men's wear lines are still rather slow. The price goods market is hardly so active, and rather spotty."

Wheat Values At Chicago Slashed

CHICAGO, Feb. 5, (AP)—Slashing of wheat values resulted today from sales here by spread traders who were making simultaneous equal speculative purchases at Winnipeg.

Much interest was shown in statements indicating that Great Britain's omission of import duties on wheat had been more or less offset by the fact that imports of wheat were expected to be governed by a quota system.

Wheat closed, unstable 1/4-1/2 below yesterday's finish, corn 1/4-1/2 down, oats 1/4-1/2 off and provisions varying from 20 cents decline to a rise of 2 cents.

PORTLAND, Feb. 5, (AP)—Wheat exporters pressing against the May, a general downward price swing was forced in both cash and futures today. On the Port-

land Grain Exchange there were no sales for the day. May closed with a loss of 1/2c, while July and September lost 3/4c per bushel.

On the Merchants' Exchange cash bluestem lost 1c again, and other varieties 1/2c per bushel. There was a further spread between white and gray oats, with a shortage of the latter. The former was down 50c per ton again.

man ranch in the lower Klamath lake area.

Owners of stock picked up when starving must pay any expenses incurred by the county and the sooner the owner gets his livestock and takes care of it the less he has to pay, Sheriff Low pointed out. The owner has only the 10 days prior to sale in which to redeem his animals.

Flocks of starving quail and pheasants have been reported to Sheriff Lloyd Low within the last few days since the snow has become so deep that straw and haystacks and food in the fields has been covered. Quail have been reported near Worden and 200 were reported in the Hartlett springs area. Two of the starved and frozen birds were brought in as evidence.

No state law provides for raising funds for feeding the birds but Sheriff Low stated that if screenings, grain, or any kind of feed for them is delivered or donated to his office he will deliver it to someone who will feed the starving birds each day.

The pheasants reported without food and starving are in the Lower Klamath lake area and in Tule Lake.
