Lane Gets Help

The Lane county delegation, headed by Judge Charles P. Barnard, was successful in securing part of its secondary highway fund for use on market roads during the next three months. Barnard asked for \$30,000 for that period to complete work now under way and at the same time give some relief to the 1443 unemployed in that county. Lane county's share of secondary highway funds for the next year was estimated at \$75,000.

Representatives from each of the five counties in the Northwest Counties Development association, all urging a larger allocation of state highway funds to Multnomah county and neighboring counties for the west, were heard by the commissioner. The speakers, headed by W. F. Woodward, stated that in the past Multnomah, Columbia, Clatsop, Washington and Tillamook counties had paid 43 per cent of the highway money, but had received only 12 per cent of the funds and six per cent of the highway mileage.

Lincoln Put Off

Lincoln county's request for more funds to continue clearing the nine miles of the South Santiam highway east from Trent creek was put over until the next meeting. Judge D. O. Wentworth of Albany said that the county had enough work ahead until the middle of March on this project.

In reply to other delegations in regard to secondary highway work, the commissioner announced it would advise some projects at the next few meetings. Local contractors would be given an opportunity to bid on these projects through their respective counties. Local labor on secondary highway jobs would be specified in the bids, it was decided.

The Chinese delegation today expressed anxiety over the "extension of warfare on the Shanghai front," while the council of the League of Nations apparently was at a standstill in its peace program.

The council peremptorily flung Article XVI of the covenant of the league, which authorizes league members to join in economic military sanctions against an aggressor.

Yen Restrained

W. W. Yen of the Chinese delegation was restrained by several factors from involving this theoretically most potent of the league's constitutional powers.

The first restraining factor was the knowledge that the American government looks askance at Article XVI, thus raising the possibility of restricted cooperation from Washington in composing the conflict.

Then, too, the Chinese wished to be given every opportunity for continued procedure under Article XV of the covenant, which provides for submission of disputes between members to the council, and council investigation of them. They felt, however, that little or no progress had been made under Article XV, and in the words of a Nanking spokesman, "the time has come when we must have some action" against the Japanese.

"We have given the council two new arms by involving Articles X and XV," the spokesman told the Associated Press, "and if these arms do not enable the league to halt the Japanese we can furnish them with Article XVI. But we do not wish to do this unless there is a chance of accomplishing some good."

"Certainly if the council indicates it needs more authority than given by the articles now in effect, we are ready to advance to Article XVI."

(Article X provides advice from the council on regional and preservation of the territorial integrity and political independence of a league member against external aggression.)

CHINESE WIN SLIGHT EDGE IN FIGHTING

moving up with reinforcements for the 19th Chinese army which has been resisting artillery bombardment for several days.

They swooped low and one of the bombs struck a closed car, splitting it from end to end and scattering the bodies of Chinese soldiers over wide area.

The Associated Press correspondent counted 16 bodies strewn along the railroad track.

The planes also bombed Chongju university, wrecking one large building and setting fire to two others.

SHANGHAI, Feb. 5 (AP)—Shanghai shook to another terrific bombardment of Chongju this afternoon and there were reports the Japanese at last had succeeded in blasting the stubborn defenders out of their position around the strategic north station.

It was impossible to verify them, for the smoke from guns and fire hung so thick over the native city no one could see what was going on.

Still Hold On

Simultaneously Japanese planes swooped about the Chinese fort at Wosung, guarding the mouth of the Whangpo, 16 miles below Shanghai, but after a two-hour bombardment the Chinese still were holding on.

For more than two days those forts have been under heavy fire from the air and from warships in the river. Repeatedly the Japanese have asserted they were reduced to a pile of scrap iron, but with each new day the bombardment has been resumed.

It was considered significant that thus far the big guns of the fort have not gone into action, but this is probably because those guns are obsolete and of no use in such an engagement as this has been.

Reinforcements Arrive

There was a widespread belief the Chinese in Chongju had received heavy reinforcements, and it was known a force of 1,000 Japanese blue jackets were landed during the day. A brigade of the Japanese army was expected tomorrow.

Chinese airplanes took a more important part in today's action than at any time hitherto. One Japanese plane was shot down, but it was not altogether certain how this was accomplished. Chinese sources here said anti-aircraft gunners had brought it down but the aviation headquarters said it was a victory of a squadron of Chinese planes over three enemy ships. This report said two additional Japanese planes had been forced down behind the Japanese lines.

A report from the Japanese naval command to Tokyo said the naval forces ashore had suffered nearly 10 per cent casualties since the fighting began. The total number of dead and wounded was placed at more than 200, including four killed and 20 wounded yesterday.

The United States army transport Chaumont and seven United States destroyers steamed into Shanghai during the day in the thick of the battle.

The Chaumont carried 1,200 American troops of the Thirty-first Infantry from Manila. It also carried about 100 additional machines. The new forces bring the total United States strength here to almost 6,000 men.

Chinese anti-aircraft gunners, equipped with antiquated anti-aircraft guns, succeeded this afternoon in checking the victorious air forces of Japan, adding greatly to the morale of their fellow defenders of Shanghai who throughout the day withstood the most terrific attack during a week of fighting in the Chongju section.

Weed Road Closed

The Klamath Falls-Weed highway is reported closed by snow drifts, which were swept in by Thursday's gales.

The caretaker of Lake o' the Woods summer resort has sent a S. O. B. call to Klamath Falls for assistance, as the heavy snowfall of the past week has caused several summer cabins to cave in and snow must be shoveled off

the roofs. Blizzards have been raging in that vicinity for several days, adding several feet to the total of 45 inches recorded on January 31.

Latest reports from Crater Lake put the snow depth at 18 feet on the level at the rim and 15 feet at Government camp. At Anna Springs 13 feet of snow was reported, at the Fort Klamath winter playground, 7 feet, and 4 1/2 feet on the level at Fort Klamath. The highway is plowed out to the ski jump beyond Fort Klamath, according to latest reports.

Both local and state weather forecasts predict a continuation of unsettled weather and more snow during the next 24 hours, with little change in temperatures.
