HOW WE CAN AVOID "DRIVE"

A Drama In The Hills

Help For Milk Fund Sought

Last week saw the development of certain new phases in the local relief program. Police Chief Guy Merrill sounded a plea for individual contributions to the police milk fund. Many private employers offered their employees opportunity to contribute one day's pay each month for four months to some phase of relief work.

These projects, both worthy, indicate a more definite appeal to the individual pocketbook than has been necessary thus far in the relief effort. We have been able to get along largely with public funds, organization benefit activities, and other less direct levies as the financial basis for most of the relief work. Voluntary contributions of one day's pay from public employees, and individual contributions of foodstuffs and clothing, have constituted the most of the direct assistance.

Now, and still without the undesirable features of an intensive "drive," there comes an appeal for voluntary help for the milk fund, and a suggestion that private employees follow the lead of public employees in donating a small portion of their month's earnings to the less fortunate.

The degree to which there is response to these appeals, and to which others offer voluntary and unasked help whenever possible, will determine whether we can continue without forcing upon the community the agonies of an intensive drive.

An Anniversary Of Great Movement

Today is the twenty-second anniversary of Boy Scouting in America. There will be celebrations from coast to coast at 8 o'clock tonight.

There is no need here to reiterate in detail the tremendous influence for good among the youth of America exerted by the scouting movement. Its very size tells of its worthiness. There are 700,000 Boy Scouts in the United States. There are 200,000 adults working with these scouts. There are 800 Boy Scouts in the Crater Lake area, which includes Klamath, Lake and Jackson counties. There are 350 scouts on the east side of the mountains in this area.

This is the anniversary of scouting. Give a thought to a great movement designed to build character and good citizenship in the American boy.

Mountains Challenge To Extreme Test

A harrowing story, but a thrilling one, is that of T. O. Hill, the volunteer mail carrier who, when found by rescuers in the hill country north of Chiloquin Saturday night, had crawled into a makeshift shelter to await death.

Death, indeed, was lurking there in the darkness as the rescuers plunged through the snow to shake Hill from the stupor that nearly always means the end when men lie down exhausted in the snow and the bitter cold. Only the faithfulness of a dog, and the determined efforts of the sturdy men who sought through the snow and the night for the lost mail carrier, prevented that tragic fate.

To those men, we pay our warm respects. How much easier it would have been to have remained close to the warm stove reading, perhaps, of some western mountain adventure, rather than taking part in one. A word should be said for the men at Chiloquin and Fort Klamath who willingly answered the call for a rescue party. Nor should there pass unnoticed the bravery of the man who volunteered to take the mail through to the snowbound settlements, and who clung to it doggedly as he struggled forward against odds too great for his strength.

It is not an unusual story in the hill country. Nearly every winter in Oregon we have incidents of freezing and eleventh-hour rescues. They all tell the same lesson—that the mountains are a stern adversary, and that those who accept their challenge to rugged adventure must be prepared for the extreme test. Especially is that true of the mountains in winter.

Then, too, the unemployed might be put to work writing books about the Harding administration. If hard times persist after that job is done, they can set to work writing repudiations of the earlier effort.

Klamath Names

RYCAN MARSH
(From Oregon Geographic Names by Lewis A. McArthur.)
Rykan Marsh, Klamath and Lake counties. Rykan Marsh derives its name from the Klamath Indian words saiga and keni, literally, the level, grassy place. The marsh covers a considerable area in the northeast part of the Klamath Indian reservation, and its outlet is Rykan river, a tributary of the Rogue river. The best information about Rykan Marsh may be found in the cooperative report issued by the state engineer entitled "Silver Lake Project." The most nearly correct elevation of the marsh, in the opinion of the writer is 4,973 feet, established by Airborne railroad surveys. There are many spellings of the name, but the U. S. geographic board has officially adopted Rykan. It seems probable that the name Thompson's Valley was at one time applied by white people to Rykan Marsh as well as to what is now known as Thompson's Valley to the north.

The name Rykan has become applied to Rykan river as a result of the association of the stream with the marsh, and also rather inappropriately, considering its literal Indian meaning, to Rykan Butte, near the northeast corner of Rykan Marsh. There are many other examples of this misapplication of names by association and proximity.

Health Talks

Extreme cold is not responsible for the occurrence of colds, since this condition is seldom seen among the Eskimos. One group of investigators found on entrance into an Eskimo settlement that there was not one cold in the settlement. However, within 72 hours after the arrival of the expedition, which included several members who had colds, every one of the inhabitants developed a cold. It is obvious, therefore, that this contact with the infection is probably the most important cause in its onset.

The general belief of investigators is that the overheated and dehydrated air of homes and offices in the United States has been responsible for lowering the resistance of the mucous membrane of the nose and the germs which are almost constantly present among human beings begin their work of infection.

Everyone has experienced the development of a cold following a night in a sleeping car, a swim in the pool, or a shower bath immediately after the body has been overheated by exercise.

It is also recognized that there are some people who have colds much more frequently than do others. One authority finds that about 15 per cent of the population have one cold a year, others have repeated colds. Usually those who have repeated colds are found to have chronic infection of their sinuses or chronic disease of the tonsils. The students at Cornell university who had at least four colds a year constituted 25 per cent of the total student body.

Some investigators feel that temperature, smoking, lack of exercise, constipation, lack of exercise, diseased tonsils and obstruction in the nose are the most important factors in increasing resistance to colds, whereas others assert that a lack of sunlight and a lack of proper vitamins in the diet may be the responsible factors in lowering resistance.

A physician for the employees at the stockyards in Chicago believes that acidosis is a predisposing factor and that the way to build up resistance to infection is to eat an alkaline diet, consisting largely of fruits and vegetables and to avoid a high protein diet, which tends to the formation of acids.
